This is true of the bridge at Sloat's Mills, of the bridges over the same stream at Centreville and near Charleston. It is true of the iron bridge across the Meduxnakeag at Woodstock; of the two bridges over the Big Shiktehauk, built this summer; of the bridge over the Monquart stream, known as the Kilfoil bridge in Johnville. It near Beechwood.
