The annual session of the Reformed Baptist Alliance opened on the 27th, at Brown's Place, Quebec, with a large attendance from various sections of this Province and Nova Scotia. The officers were all present.

The representatives from Carleton County, clerical and lay, were Rev. G. B. Traflet, A. H. Traflet, G. T. Hartley, B. Collette, Messrs J. E. Drysdale, D. Bloodworth and Miss Adelle Coleman.

Recording secretary, Rev. W. E. Wiggins.

Just E. Drysdale, of the committee on incorporation, reported, reading the act of incorporation which had been obtained, and making necessary explanations. Report adopted.

Report of the committee on the Sabbath was read and adopted. The report reaches the following conclusions expressed in the last paragraph of this report:

"The laws of secular government ought to be enforced against all violation of the Sabbath day, and the Christian has the law written on his heart and only waits opportunity to obey it."

The following report was received from the committee on temperance:
