**Overseer Henderson's Statement.**  
To the Editors of the CARLETON SENTINEL and Woodstock Free Press:  
I notice by the issue of the 22nd ult., that Dr. Rose has been quite divided in his interview as to Overseer Henderson's proceedings with reference to house and honesty. As for those views of house, and honesty they are decidedly one-sided. Had he been careful to follow the "Golden Rule" he would have charged an honest and reasonable price for his services, then the Sargefield family would have been able to pay him.  
No doubt they are a poor family and in consideration of that fact Dr. Rose should have exercised his principles of honor and honesty, along the line of humanity, and so doing have shown that he understood the principle of honor and honesty, further that he was concerned. But in lieu of that, he made out an enormous bill, that in all probability years would elapse before the family could defray such a debt. Now Overseer Henderson considers it his duty to defend his position as an overseer and see to it that there are no unjust bills making a name for the Parish in his name, nor extortions on the poor if he can help it. Overseer Henderson has not the power to order any party out to seek for a doctor, as Rose later in his correspondence to the Press and SENTINEL. Neither did the overseers need to disclaim, as they did not seek for Dr. Rose. As for Overseer Henderson, he did not know that such a person existed as Dr. Rose.  
Mrs. Sargefield's son went or sent for a Dr. Now as to the woman's value, that is for her family to decide, and likely when Dr. Rose finds that she is worth properly enough to pay all bills he too will agree with her family that she is of some value, and in my opinion Dr. Rose will make some sensible calls and dine and sup with Mrs. Sargefield on the steps in that "Outer case." He will learn that there is property enough to pay bills which fact, at the present time, he seems to doubt. Better he would learn facts than to waste time, wasting his spleen on the supposed failure of others.  
Dr. Rose knows that Overseer Henderson did not seek for him. He has been informed as to that fact repeatedly. Rose speaks of Curtis getting his pay, but I presume Rose is mistaken in that particular, as Curtis has stated that he received his pay of the county. Now it does not appear that Dr. Rose values other people's time, all his consideration is for self, the fact is evident when he would expect to see the overseers to leave his crew of men in the woods and go to see if there were letters for him to answer from Dr. Rose. Overseer Henderson is not obliged to move at the beck and bow of Dr. Rose, but if Henderson valued the time of Dr. Rose, his bill would be equal to that of Rose.  
Dr. Rose dwells on the point of Henderson's disclaiming. Now how would Henderson be supposed to know that Dr. Rose was planning to get his pay off the parish when the Sargefield family holding real estate to the value of five hundred dollars and personal property to the \$3000, and a house worth \$4000, and when they, the Sargefield family, had never applied to him for aid from the parish. And how can Dr. Rose be so unreasoning and so void of humanity as to expect that Overseer Henderson should have forbidden any one of going for a doctor, and more, he must be void of comprehensive power if he thinks that Overseer Henderson had power to forbid anyone Sargefield of sending for a doctor for his mother. Now, as to Overseer Henderson helping to pay for a nurse, that was done in haste to suit the situation, and along the line of humanity, and Overseer Henderson and Manuel agreed together to pay the nurse from their own resources, their proceedings in that particular did not stand the test. For all will understand, that neither Henderson nor Manuel makes study of that branch of education, neither do they profess being adepts as to what will stand law, but they profess being honest farmers and also to practice humanity as far as in their power. Now as far as this matter of the nurse is concerned, duty and humanity, with Dr. Rose's orders combined, authorized them to employ a nurse without hesitation or waiting to consult a lawyer. Now Overseer Henderson claims that when the County had the lunatic in charge, they should not have set him free to commit such depredations. The first thing he did after coming home was to drive the family of the lunatic with an axe and was then not to return, or he would chop their heads off, which proceeding was immediately reported to Foster, and after the lapse of some 4 or 5 days the word came from Foster that he must consult the doctor of the asylum, before he could proceed and in the meantime the lunatic had committed this crime, after these parties having been warned. Now in consideration of the above facts, Overseer Henderson claims that if the bills cannot be collected of the Sargefield property, then either of the county or of the individual who had him in charge, and the overseers claim that in all justice and fair play that the parish pay liable, if not, the county is.

Dominion Parliament.  
OTTAWA, July 8.—In the house, to day, Mr. Davin moved that it was expedient to apply \$5,000 to aid in establishing creameries and cheese factories in the Northwest Territories, and that the government should consider the propriety of increasing the one cent duty on butter from 4 to 5 cents a pound in order to enable the Northwest farmers to compete with Australians in the British Columbia market.  
Mr. Bennett moved in amendment that there was no reason for granting aid in this case, which did not apply to the older provinces.  
Dr. Sprague moved in amendment to the amendment that the debate be adjourned. On division Dr. Sprague's motion prevailed by 62 to 57, a government majority of only five. The result was cheered by the opposition. There were nine ministers voting so that the government side was a majority of four out of six of their own votes. Some one in a jocular mood shouted "Resign."  
(Foster declines to speak.)  
On the motion to adjourn Mr. Laurier said, I take advantage of this motion to ask the leader of the house if he can give any information in regard to the rumor that is now current that three members of the cabinet have resigned this afternoon.  
Mr. Foster—I can give no information to my hon. friend, but I advise him not to put his trust in rumors.  
Then I inform my hon. friend that I shall renew this question to-morrow and shall then take the opportunity of drawing the attention of the house to it.  
Mr. McCarthy—I should like to ask the leader of the house whether there is authority of his excellency, the governor general, for the announcement made this afternoon at the meeting of parliament in January next. The hon. gentleman did not say whether he had such authority, or whether it seems to me that an announcement made in this manner is a proceeding of a certain day and another session be called in rather usurping the prerogative of his excellency unless the government had such authority.  
Mr. Foster—My hon. friend will be pleased to hear that we have not usurped the prerogative of his excellency in this regard.  
Mr. Foster made the following statement in the house this afternoon, when questioned by Mr. Laurier as to the policy of the government on the Manitoba school question. I desire to state that the government has had under its consideration the reply of the Manitoba legislature to the remedial order of the 21st March, 1895, and after careful deliberation has arrived at the following conclusion: Though there may be differences of opinion as to the exact meaning of the reply in question, the government believes that it may be interpreted as holding out some hope of an amicable settlement of the Manitoba school question on the basis of possible action by the Manitoba government and legislature, and the dominion government is most unwilling to take any action which can be interpreted as forestalling or precluding such a desirable consummation. The government has also considered the difficulties to be met with in preparing and perfecting legislation on so important and intricate a question during the last hours of the session. The government, therefore, decided not to ask parliament to deal with remedial legislation during the present session. The communication will be sent immediately to the Manitoba government on the day of the meeting of the legislature, with a view to ascertaining whether the government is disposed to make a settlement of the question which will be reasonably satisfactory to the minority of that province, without making it necessary to call into requisition the powers of the dominion parliament. A session of

the present parliament will be called together to meet not later than the first Thursday of January next. I by that time the Manitoba government fails to make a satisfactory arrangement to remedy the grievance of the minority, the dominion government will be prepared at the next session of parliament to call as above stated to introduce and press to a conclusion such legislation as will afford a satisfactory remedy to the grievance of the minority based upon the lines of the judgment of the privy council and the remedial order of the 21st of March, 1895.  
Mr. Haggart gives notice to-night of a bill respecting the Winnipeg & Great Northern Railway, known as the Hudson Bay road. It divides the subsidy of \$80,000 a year already granted to this road into two parts of \$40,000, so that if half the road is completed and operated \$40,000 would be payable. This subsidy was voted for the carriage of mails and government supplies.
