(Continued from Last Week.)

The first business taking up Monday forenoon

was the report on Deceased Brethren,

presented by Rev G. A. Hartley. Suitable

reference was made to the demise of Rev

James L. Phillips, D. D., missionary to India,

Rev S. W. Shaw of Hartland and Rev Ezekiel

Sippell, the latter one of the fathers of the

denomination. Most touching was the tri-

bute of love to the life work of Mr Sippell.

Committee to revise blanks for reports for

district meetings, Revs J. W. Clarke, W. J.

Halse and G. A. Hartley.

Mr Clark presented a report of suitable

blanks for such reports.

Mr William Peters spoke to the report

Rev J. W. McLeod moved, seconded by Rev

G. A. Hartley, that General Conference Sun-

day be held at Woodstock, N. B. Spoken to

by Revs E. B. Grey, A. Perry, G. A. Hartley,

J. P. Parsons, Wm Peters, Wm Halse and

M. Fawcett. The discussion was quite in-

teresting. Motion amended to read that

the particular Sunday be deter-

mined by pastor or church. Motion, as

amended, carried.

According to notice given last year, Rev

G. A. Hartley offered the following resolu-

tion, seconded by Rev J. P. Parsons:

"That we of our Rules of Order be

changed, so that instead of reading as it now

does 'A motion or resolution to prevail,

must receive a vote of the members pre-

sent,' it should read: 'A motion or resolu-

tion to prevail, must receive a majority vote

of the members present.'

Rev A. H. Union of Advent Baptist

church, was introduced to conference, and

was received by conference, rising, as Mo-

torial extended welcome.

Rev Mr Hartley spoke of his efforts to

have the right of women voting in their

respective churches given to women. A res-

olution he had offered at the Conference had

been supported by a majority, but lost because

of a minority report. He had brought to

this resolution that such a motion might be

carried.

Motion was withdrawn with the under-

standing that arrangements would be made

giving right of voting in churches where

members so desired.

Free Baptists. Report adopted section by

section.

Rev T. O. D. Watt presented report on Sab-

bath Observance.

Bro Moderator—Your committee on Sab-

bath beg to submit the following report:

"On the conference, recognizing the need

and blessing which come to mankind from

thru God's institution of one day out of seven

as a day of rest, and that this Sabbath rest

includes rest for our whole complex living

body, mind and soul. The thought of God

is the resting place for the hovering, weary

spirit which, refreshed and strengthened,

it again finds true light.

The nerves calmed, the whole nature

soothed and fortified by the rest which God

meant us to have on his holy day. It is in

and a holiday in a holy sense, for we ap-

proach it as it lies for us in the thought of

God. In a true Sabbath there must be ser-

vice; rest is God's gift to us; worship is his

offering to God; service to his ministry is

man in the name of the Master. It was his

Sabbath of love of unbinding the

heavy burdens, that brought upon him the

serious accusation of formalists. We are

keeping the Sabbath in holiest sense, when

we follow him in any good work. And this

Shabbath believes it is the duty of our peo-

ple, as well as all lovers of God, in the

secrereness of this day, either by action of

the Government, corporations, companies

or private individuals.

publications, text books of their own reli-

gious denomination. He didn't think it

advisable to carry a full stock of literature in

each depository; Rev B. H. Noble, cor-

responding secretary; James Patterson, Esq.,

Treasurer.

The Women's Foreign Missionary Society

convened in the church at 3.30, Mrs Joseph

McLeod presiding. At this meeting there

was a large attendance; the church being

well filled, a goodly proportion of the au-

dience being ladies interested in the work

of missions.
