The minutes of last session were read and approved.

Reports from schools were made as follows: Jackson Baptist, by the superintendent, B. Alexander, as prosperous and in good working order; Upper Waterville F. C. Baptist, by W. J. Davis, Supt., school in a prosperous condition, rather on the increase, interest good, striving to bring the children to Christ; using their lesson helps at home and leaving them there, bringing only their Bibles to school; Third Tier, by Mrs. Alexander, as prosperous, having an average of 25 or 26; Victoria, by Mr. J.
