A Warning.

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel:

No doubt you remember very distinctly the Porter versus Hale, Fraser and Irvine Equity suit, regarding the title to some 2800 acres of land in the parish of Wicklow, known as the "Campbell land." The said suit was commenced in 1887, and the Supreme Court of Canada confirmed the title to the said defendants, in 1894.

Two questions still remained to be settled between the defendants, viz., partition of the land and cost of suit. There are two ways of partitioning the land, by mutual agreement or court of Equity; the first is inexpensive, the latter is very expensive. As your readers might expect, I have always been ready to divide by mutual agreement. About the first of July, last past, I received a letter from Messrs. Fisher and Connell, Barristers, Woodstock, informing me that they were employed by Messrs. Hale and Fraser to commence proceedings for partitioning the "Campbell land," and settling expenses, etc. I learned after a short time, however, that neither the barristers named nor their clients wanted to partition the land by mutual agreement. In order to leave Messrs. Connell and Fisher and their clients without excuse, I decided to make the following proposal, and did make the said following proposal to Mr. Connell, junior member of the said firm, on Monday, the fifth day of the present month, and I also made a similar statement to Mr. H. A. Lucas, in the same S. B. by Mrs. S. P. White.

I proposed to divide the 1400 acres east of the Knoxford road, with the triangular piece of 104 acres in front, into three equal parts as near as can be, giving Messrs. Hale and Fraser first choice, provided they divide the block of 725 acres adjoining the international boundary, and also the river lots, consisting of about 500 acres, giving me first choice, but value of the land in the boundary line block and also in the river lots there is in the Knoxford land, I am willing that they put a money value on them and give me a check to buy or sell, or I am willing that they sell the boundary line block and also the river lots at public auction and divide the proceeds of sale; part of the river lots are of course sold, but I mean to sell the mortgages. Or, if they will divide the Knoxford land, giving me first choice, I will divide the balance on the same terms as already proposed.

Shortly after I received the first letter from Messrs. Fisher and Connell, in July last, I met them in the town of Woodstock; the junior member said that they might have to summon me in court of Equity, and if I did not want the sheriff after me he would let me know by mail, and I could go down and acknowledge service, or he would send the summons up and I could acknowledge service on the back of summons. I thanked him, and told him if he dropped me a postal card I would go down at any time. O.

ST. JOHN LETTER.

(From our overland correspondent.)

St. John, N. B., Aug. 19, 1895.

The annual meeting of the Maritime Baptist Association will open in Germain street church, on Saturday. Between three and four hundred delegates are expected, and the members of Germain street church are making great preparations for the reception of the visitors. It is the jubilee year and a great deal of interest will be manifested.

The International Steamship Company is offering cheap excursions to Boston, only \$5.00 for the round trip. A group of St. John people will take advantage of the reduced fare.

The city has been full of tourists during the past week. They were nearly all Americans. A great many were never here before, but when they went away it was nearly always with the intention of returning next year.
