Richard deposed the loss of population.

The growth of the older provinces has not been, he showed, one-half the growth of England, an old country exporting men and women to all parts of the earth. The fraud of the industrial census was further exposed by extended reference.

Sir Richard O. Wright found no fault with the increased number of spirits. In regard to the taxes on sugar he only remarked that for every dollar which went into the public chest two went into the pockets of the farmers. He alluded to the reported \$300,000 said to have been made by the Acadia Refining Company of Halifax, and said it should be considered whether that company should not be made to yield up that money.

Taking a general view of the condition of the country, Sir Richard said he had not reached a period of standard, for which the only possible immediate relief was reciprocity with the United States, the opportunity for which might be lost through the disunion, treachery and robbery of the men in office. The result of sixteen years' "folly, fraud and falsehood" Sir Richard sought to bring home by saying that the number of bushels of wheat required in 1878 to discharge the interest on our total indebtedness was 50,000,000; in 1893 600,000,000; in 1878 the total Dominion taxes amounted to \$20,000,000, which 20,000,000 bushels of wheat would pay. In 1893 the total taxes under the tariff amounted to \$60,000,000, and would at present prices require 120,000,000 bushels of wheat to pay. At Confederation our debt was about one-third of that of the United States—today it is treble. He gave the government some advice in the serious condition to which they had brought the country, and among other things not to stretch out for new territory. Sir Richard took occasion to say that the opposition bore no ill will towards the majority as a class. They had prospered more as a class up to 1878 than since. He would not conceal from the House that a considerable number of the members of the majority were in a class with the people. He believed that at least the following friends were pretty well exploded: The home market fraud; the desire for economy fraud; the sham loyalty fraud; the desire for reciprocity fraud; the general prosperity fraud; the reduction in prices by reason of light prices fraud.
