St. John Correspondence.

The Waterways of the Province—Improvements in St. John—Trade Extending in Every Direction—Business Notes.

The waterway—(N. W. Brunswick and the facilities which they afford for the transportation of passengers and freight are wonderful to contemplate. I will name some of the vessels which are always available by the people of St. John and the people residing in their vicinity, during the summer, and give a low estimate of the carrying capacity of their steamers:—

Then we have on the Grand Manan route the Flamingo; Yarmouth route, the Alpha; Minas Basin route, the Hiawatha; Digby and Annapolis route, the Prince Rupert and Montserrat, the service of all of which extends through the year.

In anticipation of the close of navigation the river and lake steamers are doing the heaviest freight traffic of the year, being loaded on their arrival with cattle, dressed meats and farm produce generally and carrying away large stocks of farmers', lumbermen's and merchants' supplies. Notwithstanding the increase in our railway facilities these steamers are doing a constantly increasing business; indeed, it is but a few years since a regular steamer service was opened on the Kennebec and Belville, which now accommodates a large passenger and freight traffic, and, since the Prince Rupert was placed on the Digby route, the travel and freight between this city and western Nova Scotia has more than doubled. Whatever tends to bring the people of a country into closer communication fosters trade and increases production. What Carleton, York and Kings counties have accomplished in the way of agriculture, and stock and fruit raising will be emulated by the people in almost every section of the province as better channels of intercourse are opened and better opportunities afforded for the exchange of commodities.

Thousands of dollars have been expended, during the past summer, in the improvement of the public squares, park and Rural Cemetery and in the erection of new buildings in the city and its outskirts, but just now, as the season draws to a close, the handling of incoming and outgoing merchandise takes predominance. The factories are mostly running night and day and the wharves and railway station are crowded with incoming and outgoing freight.

To show how business is increasing here I have not to mention that of Messrs Manchester, Robertson & Allison as an example. In 1873 their store on King St., 40 x 100, four stories and basement, sufficed. In 1879 they built an annex in the rear of P. B. Baker & Sons and O. Flood & Sons, 26 x 50. In 1885 they erected another in the rear of the Sears building to accommodate their increasing carpet trade, 40 x 50. Then they bought the Jones building on Canterbury St. for warehousing whole packages. Last year they bought the Daniel & Boyd property on Market square and Chipman Hill for general warehousing and sold the Canterbury street property, and the first of January they will occupy the Messrs Harris building on German street, 50 x 70, four stories and basement for their wholesale carpet department. This will be connected with the King street store by an annex, about 20 x 40, which is now being built. Such business progress, the fruit of industry, integrity, and a thorough knowledge of the markets, has never before been witnessed in the Maritime Provinces.

In this letter I have alluded to little else than business; just now nothing else is thought of in St. John.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 25, 1895. There is an easy feeling in the country market, and to persons who purpose bringing or sending produce down I would say "don't." The river boats are glutting the market with vegetables and most of every description. The farmers living along the river are rushing their products down before the close of navigation, and as a consequence the prices are low. The daily papers state quite early in the season that the potato crop would be short on account of rot. This appeared to be the opinion of many of the farmers themselves, but if I may be allowed to judge of the size of the crop by the number of barrels that have been and are coming into this city daily I should say that the crop is not only an average one, but much larger than usual. They are being shipped to some extent, but the crop is so large in the United States that the shippers have not been greatly encouraged by their returns.

Three problems have been before the citizens during the last week, namely, the school question, the bread question, the time question. The controversy relative to the price of bread has been carried on mainly by the editor of the Telegraph and the editor of the Star, whom, it may be stated, seldom agree upon anything. I am not a betting man, but am willing to swallow my scruples on this occasion and offer to wager any person a last year's almanac (Bayley's) the public (editor) that any and every person who has been carefully following the articles written by the Star and Telegraph re the bread question, cannot now tell "right" from "left" and is trying to prove or what they wish their respective readers to believe, unless it is that their opponent in the discussion does not know what he is writing about. The school question has assumed quite an interesting aspect in that the ladies are taking a hand in it. They have not been slow to express their opinion with regard to the matter. The trustees wish to amalgamate the grammar with the Victoria High School, claiming that the former under the present staff is inefficient and not capable of producing the best results. The board wish to place the boys, some 150, on the upper floor of the Victoria School building, and secure the services of Professor Bridges of Fredericton, as head master. There are 800 girls in attendance at the Victoria School and it is pointed out by those opposed to the scheme that the accommodations are not sufficient, and that under the existing circumstances co-education would not work successfully. The citizens are not favorable to the change and it is thought that the board of trustees will have to seek some other arrangement. The trustees of this city, unlike those of any other town in the province, are appointed by the Government and council, and while they spend the people's money, are responsible to no one but themselves.

The confusion of time in this city is a great nuisance and should have been remedied years ago. The Royal Hotel was the first to make the change and now we have the Post Office, Victoria Hotel, Dominion Express Co., Board of Trade and others who are steadily doing it on their own responsibility. The theory of a prominent gentleman, that it is not advisable to make the change because some people would still keep local time is a "back number" idea. Some people preferred to burn candles when gas was introduced while others preferred the old stage coach to railways, but the march of improvement went on just the same. Our citizens are ripe now for standard time and should have it without delay.

Freeman MacDonald, who, it will be remembered, was seriously injured in the Moore head disaster something over a year ago, is at work again. He had a long, hard fight for his life, but is well and strong now. Strange to say he remembers nothing about the accident, so that the direct cause of it will probably never be known.

This has been a great year for baseball in St. John. There are 117 clubs in the city more or less and to hear some of the kids expatiate on strikes and pass balls, and fouls, home runs and curves, and nuffs and un-pires, decisions and all the rest, is enough to turn the head of one who takes little or no interest in them. The football season has just opened and young men with black eyes and arms in slings will soon be seen upon the streets. A football enthusiast is a queer creature, too. If he fell down two stories in the office or warehouse of his employer he would be laid up for a week, but he can tackle and scrimmage, roll on the ground, collar every member of the opposing team, jump on him and then he will get up smiling and tell you it's great fun. While it cannot be said in truth that the matrimonial fever has struck St. John yet, a number of the young men have succumbed to the cunning little tempter cupid.

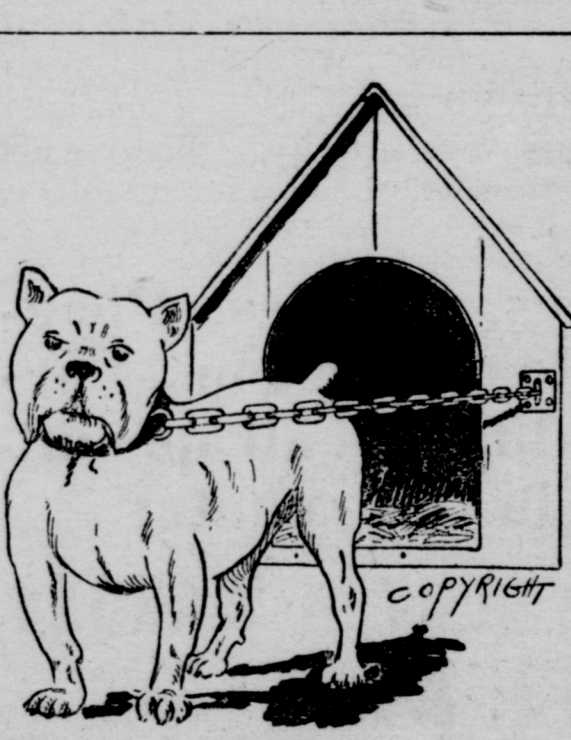

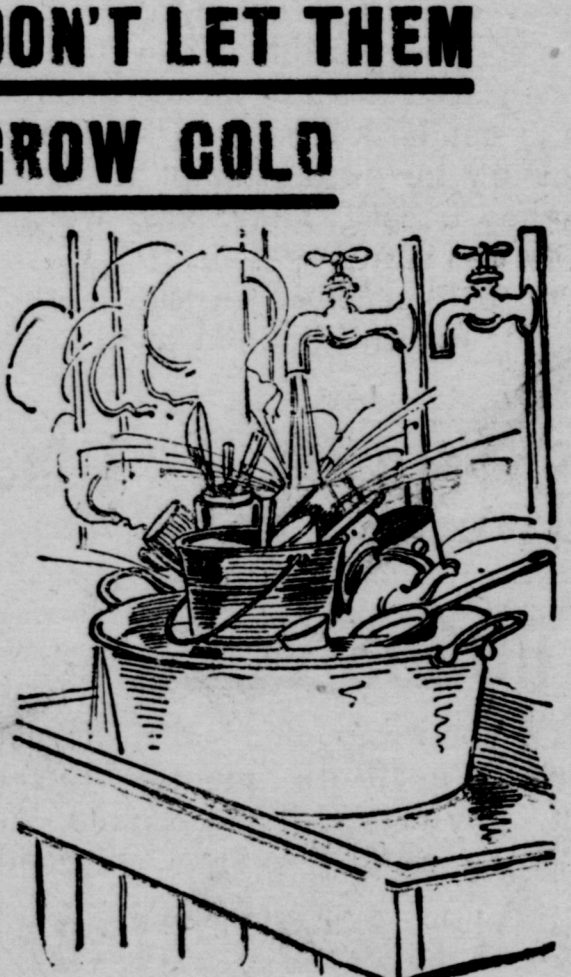

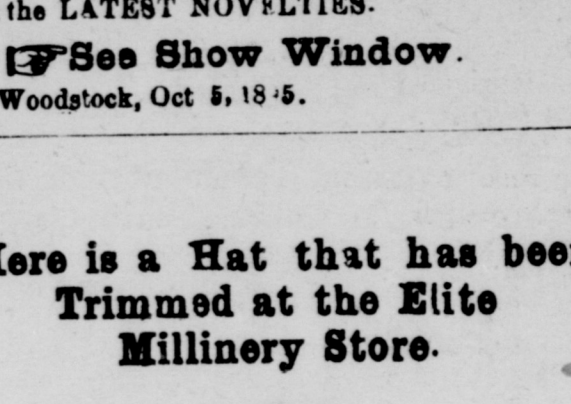
