Mr. Emerson submitted his report on the Suspension Bridge, and recommended that the evidence be submitted to the law officer of the Crown to determine whether there was any ground for proceeding against anyone, and if so, whom and to what the advisability of bringing action either civil or criminal against these men or either of them.

Census of Industries.

A good many conflicting statements are being constantly made and printed as regards the increase in the number of industries and of hands employed, between the census periods of 1881 and 1891. In the '93 session of the Dominion parliament the subject was discussed and many of the representatives, from different towns and cities, questioned the accuracy of the census returns, and asked of the Finance Minister, detailed statements showing how the general conclusion was reached. Mr. Collier, M. P., was among the enquirers and the Minister brought down the following table, showing the number of hands employed in 1881 and 1891, and the increase or decrease in the number of hands employed, between the census periods of 1881 and 1891.

Below are four columns giving in one the names of the proprietors of the several industries; one the number of hands employed in each in '81; one the number of hands employed in '91—these two are reprints of the returns submitted by the Finance Minister—and then one column gives the figures from a census made by ourselves in 1894. The columns of names listed in '81 and '91, the figures showing in which of the persons who were or were not credited with being in business. The number of hands employed as given in our own column was obtained direct from the proprietors, but with few exceptions.

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HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Feb. 27.—Bill relating to the Town of Woodstock, reducing the number of councillors to 6; fixing the qualification of councillors to 6; awarding of \$1000 worth of property and providing for the form of ballot and mode of voting was passed with amendments.

Mr. Emerson opposed the reduction of the number of councillors from 10 to 6, as provided in section 7.

Mr. Dibbels asked the question whether the change would be made, would be left to the vote of the people. It had been found that the business of the town could be carried on much more efficiently and conveniently by six councillors than by ten.

Mr. Mitchell committed a bill amending law in relation to the construction of railways.

Mr. Mitchell said that the bill provided that notwithstanding anything contained in the act of 1894, chapter 11, section 11, a company or body corporate complying with the terms of the act, in other respects, should be entitled to the same rights and privileges as if it were a natural person.

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
