**Benton Items.**

For several days last week the people of Benton did little more than fight fire. Several days before, fire had caught in the woods between Benton and Oak Mountain, along the railway track. It is said that the conflagration originated in sparks from the C. P. engine. Last Monday night, about midnight, the flames burst into the woods immediately behind the residence of William Anderson, and bore down upon the residence of W. J. The woods on the Potowaug, three miles above Benton, took fire, and a party of men were despatched to that section, where they had lively work. However, no buildings in this vicinity were destroyed.

The picnic was concluded by a dinner to-day. The proceeds are to be applied towards the fitting up of the parsonage.


