Lindsay Items Nov. 12, 1896.

Not having seen any items from Lindsay in the CARLETON SENTINEL for a long time, I will try and do a little sketching.

It seems queer, that a village of the size of Lindsay, should not have some one capable of writing it up in the local newspaper.

This is my first attempt at writing for the paper, and the good people of Carleton Co. will please excuse me if I do not make a creditable showing.

Perhaps some people may not have a very clear idea of where Lindsay is, in this and that respect, I will state that Lindsay was formerly called Seventh Tier, and is located about seven (7) miles from Woodstock, on the main road between those two places.

Lindsay has a population of about one hundred (100), about half of which are farmers. We have no stores as yet, and probably do not need any, as there is a store at Belleville, about three (3) miles from Lindsay.

A blacksmith shop is being erected near the centre of the village, but we have no blacksmith yet. I think this would be a good location for an enterprising man of that profession.

Lindsay has two churches—F. O. Baptist and Methodist. Rev. Mr. Frazee preaches once a month in the Methodist house and Rev. John Dymally at the other house in the same church.

Rev. Mr. Dymally is, at present, a resident of our village, and is very much esteemed. The pastoral services of Rev. Wm. H. DeWare. He is an eloquent preacher. His style is clear, forcible and to the point. He has served once in two weeks, has been here about a year and has been here for the ensuing year. The membership of the F. O. Baptist church was largely increased, as the result of a series of revival meetings held by Evangelist Humbert in February and March, 1895. Eleven young men and women were baptized, and five united with the church.

A Union Sabbath School is held in this church (F. O.), every Sabbath at 10 a. m. Robert Briggs is Superintendent. We have a G. O. C. 3 Quarters, which I consider, are the best in the Co.

Our day school is taught by Miss Ellis Wolburn, and is believed, by the farmers and well liked by the children.

Now, Messrs Editors, I will not trespass on your space any further, and hoping you will see fit to honor my feeble effort to such an extent as to print the same I will say "Au revoir."

LUMBERING ON THE OTTAWA.

A LIFE OF GREAT HARDSHIP AND EXPOSURE.

River Drivers Often Waist Deep in Ice Waters—Pain-Racked Bodies the Frequent Outcome—Only the Most Robust Can Stand This Weary Round of Toil.

Only those who have engaged in the arduous occupation of lumbering know how dangerous it is to their livelihood, for among the many vocations of men that of lumberman ranks among the most dangerous and difficult. That is the heavy shanty labor from earliest dawn to evening star, when the toiler for half the year is remote from home and friends, and whose daily round is to eat and work and sleep, only getting an occasional glimpse of the outside world through a long looked for letter from some loved one far away.

Then the days lengthen, the frozen lake breaks up, and comes the driving of logs and heavy timber down the tortuous swift running stream, when necessity often calls the driver to wade body deep in the swift flowing water. None but the strong can engage in such heavy labor, only the most robust are able to stand the ten hours daily toil, with but a mid day hour's respite. Such, in brief, is the life of many thousands of laborers in the Ottawa valley, and among
