## GLASSVILLE SHOW.

### Aberdeen Ladies to the Fore.

Wednesday, the 13th, was as fine a day as could be desired for an out-of-door Show and on that day the SENTINEL was one of a crowd of visitors, representing all sections of the county, at Glassville, to see the show of the Aberdeen Agricultural Society, a society which has been noted for its grand Exhibitions in the past.

Whether it was on account of the heavy wind and rain storm of the preceding night; whether because of late harvesting; because of light yields in some field productions; or because farmers are taking less interest than formerly in local agricultural shows—whether from any or all of these causes combined the fact remains that, as a whole, this show was scarcely up to the standard of all round excellence established during many years by Aberdeen.

It may be said that the success of a local show depends upon the influence of local patriotism and pride in home sentiment more than upon the financial consideration, "how many prizes can be taken."

The attendance by the general public was large and the physical wants of the visitors were amply provided for. Love's hotel and stables were over-crowded. James Millie had made fine provision, in his large house and barn, for man and beast, and here the SENTINEL and his travelling companion, O R Watson, was most courteously treated. John McIntosh opened his spacious and handsome new residence for the accommodation of visitors, and the ladies of the Presbyterian church, in a suitable building, provided a most appetizing dinner and supper. And beside, all the hospitable people of Glassville were most attentive and kind.

Among the improvements of recent date most noticeable in the neighborhood is the large, handsomely designed, furnished and well appointed establishment of Mr M Welch, in the southern part of the village.

It has been the SENTINEL's pleasant duty to chronicle, from time to time, the rapid progress of this most notable settlement from the time when the present writer first stood among its then uncultured wilderness, with but one or two log huts, down to the present when it flourishes with scores a peer among the "new settlements."

We mentioned in the sub-heading, the Ladies of Aberdeen. And to their high credit let it be said that, on the present occasion, they, in their department of the show, not only maintained their own reputation but contributed to an aggregate success of the whole affair.

The list of prizes awarded, given below, will show, without an expression of opinion on our part, the most meritorious animals and articles exhibited. We only add here that the number of entries made with the Secretary was very much less than in previous occasions of the kind.

## ANDOVER & PERTH.

### Agricultural Society's Exhibition.

On the 14th, under most favorable auspices as to weather, the agricultural society of Andover and Perth, Victoria County, held an exhibition at Andover.

There was a good representative attendance, visitors from Carleton and Victoria Counties helping to swell the quota.

The Secretary of the Society Mr F E Henderson was most attentive and discharged the onerous duties of his office with efficiency.

The exhibit in the aggregate was a large and excellent one, a notable feature being the show of potatoes and other roots which embraced a great variety.

Among the exhibits there were some 16 horses; 24 head of cattle; 12 sheep; 8 swine; 18 crops of fowl; 8 of oats; 3 Buckwheat; 3 barley; 1 timothy seed; 3 wheat; 10 beans—a remarkably fine assortment; 3 peas; 5 corn; 12 potatoes; 19 apples—an excellent display; 9 turnips; 10 butter; 3 dairy cheese; and a wonderful showing of domestic manufactures, fancy work, knitted goods, &c. Among the fancy goods a lap robe of velvet crazy work was conspicuous and much admired.

A nicely arranged and handsome display of potted plants was contributed by Mrs J W Curry.

Among the oats was one exhibit of black; a fine specimen shown by D Curry Tobique river.

Of the horses a pair of working horses shown by John Graham; a Clydesdale Stallion by Alex Henderson; a two year old by D W Pickett; a pair of general purpose horses by Albert Love were particularly noticed, and in the cattle—pure bred—were a Durham bull shown by D W Pickett; an Ayrshire bull by J E Wright; an Ayrshire heifer by Alfred Stevens; a Holstein bull by James Howlett; a Devon bull by J E Porter, very fine animals.
