It may be said that the success of a local show depends upon the influence of local patriotism and pride in home sentiment more than upon the financial consideration, "how many prizes can be taken,"

The attendance by the general public was large and the physical wants of the visitors were amply provided for. Love's hotel and stables were over-crowded. James Millie bad made fine provision, in his large house and barns, for man and beast, and here the SEN-TINEL and his travelling companion, O R Watson, was most courteously treated, John McIntosh opened his spacious and handsome new residence for the accommodation of visitors, and the ladies of the Presbyterian church, in a suitable building, provided a most appetising dinner and supper. And be sides, all the hespitable people of Glassville were most attentive and kind.

Among the improvements of recent date most noticeable in the neighborhood is the large, handsomely designed, furnished and well appointed establishment of Mr M Welch, in the southern part of the village.

It has been the SENTINEL'S pleasant duty to chronicle, from time to time, the rapid progress of this most notable settlement from the time when the present writer first stood among its then uncleared wilderness, with but one or two log buts, down to the present when it flourishes with scarce a peer among Lyon. the "new settlements."
