Free Baptist General Conference.

The above christian body began its yearly session, at Lower Watford on the 1st inst., p. m., by erecting the monument of the Rev. G. W. Orser and wife; the monument was made by Oldham Brothers of Southampton, York County, and was erected satisfactorily to the Conference. Friday, 2 p. m., the memorial address on the life and labors of the late Rev. G. W. Orser was delivered by Rev. M. Orser, in a concise, correct, satisfactory and christian spirit; many hearts were deeply moved by the speaker in his touching and inspiring address to the many incidents to which he referred concerning the father and founder of our beloved denomination, whose life and labors still live in the minds of our people. 7 p. m., the regular work of the yearly meeting began with a sermon by Rev. T. Lewis. 2 p. m., yearly conference with communion, between fifty and one hundred reporting themselves and communicating at close of meeting. 7:30 p. m., business meeting; we did not have reports from all the churches, but there was a creditable representation from the all over the denominational field, and the reports of our churches has been better this year than in former years; 134 have been baptized during the year; 13 have been received numerically. The conference was financially and spiritually, doctrinally and financially and the outlook is hopeful. Sabbath, 9 a. m., prayer meeting one hour. 10 a. m., Rev. D. Brooks preached an excellent sermon on the spiritual life; 3 p. m., Rev. A. Gibson preached a well delivered and well conceived sermon; 7:30 p. m., Rev. T. Lewis gave in a clear, decisive and christian manner and was well received by the conference. Through all the Sabbath services many testimonies were given for the gospel preached by the several speakers and the blessing of God was enjoyed all through the day. Monday 8 a. m., mat for business; roll call there was present, of Ministers, Rev. O. Orser, G. E. Orser, S. E. Sprague, M. P. Orser, S. H. Curry, D. E. Brooks, G. A. Gibson, H. H. Brown, L. Lewis, Rev. J. H. Capen, J. H. Sprague; church licentiate, H. H. Capen, J. H. Sprague; the messengers from the different churches answered to their names and were recorded ready for business for the ensuing year. The ordinary routine business was taken up, reading of minutes, reports of committees, unfinished business, new business. Rev. O. Orser was elected chairman for the ensuing year and Rev. M. P. Orser, clerk. During the Conference Rev. M. P. Orser, D. E. Brooks and Rev. T. Lewis were appointed a committee to prepare a bill to present to the next session of the Local Legislature, asking them to grant, what our first position required for, we hope our committee will give a hearing in the Council Chamber of our Government on the merits of the Act of Incorporation we have asked for, and your humble servants hope for a favorable consideration of this question. The next general meeting of the F B will convene with the church at Harlow, O. C., the first Saturday in July, 1898, at 10 a. m. The October Quarterly meeting will be located by a committee later on. The third Quarterly meeting will meet with the Carleton, Mass. church, last Saturday in March, 1898, at 10 a. m. Rev. G. H. Orser is appointed a general missionary to visit during the year the unreported churches of our Conference and establish in them, if possible, pastoral care; we hope those churches will be on the alert for our missionary and do all they can to make his mission a prosperous one, and that any church without pastoral care will at once correspond with our ministers and secure some pastoral care. The churches are requested to take collection for their very dear pastor and missionary, and we want them to become personally interested in this mission. A vote of thanks was tendered to the church and community for their very competent and christian care and hospitality in providing so bountifully for the yearly meeting.
