He said the Bible was a peculiar nication has been received from the British government asking if Canada is prepared to exchange a contingent of artillery. The conditions on which a colonial brigade will go to Great Britain are, that it shall remain for two years; that it shall not be called upon for foreign service ; that the pay shall be that hitherto received in Ganada, and that it shall conform to the requirements of the Imperial services. The pay of Imperial artillerymen in Oanada will be that pre-viously received in Great Britain. It is probable an affirmative answer will be sent by the Dominion government.
