The war articles in the September Scribner's are led by Richard Harding Davis's account of "The Rough Riders' Fights' at Guasimas" There is no information at second-hand in this article; Mr Davis was in the thick of the fight end writes of what he saw. When he crushes, once for all, the story of a surprise, he does it with positive knowledge of the previous ordere given and received by Gen Wheeler and Col Wood. The conversations he had with the men in the fight are vivid bits of dramatic dialogue.
