By direction of the County Council the following extracts from the Act relating to Peddlers, passed in 1895, is published for general information, and all Constables are requested to enforce the provisions of said Act:

Section 6—Every person hawking or peddling, or attempting to hawk or peddle, shall at all times, upon request of any Constable, exhibit to him his license therefor, and if he refuses or neglects so to do may thereupon and without warrant be arrested by such Constable and taken before a Justice of the Peace, and all proceedings shall thereupon be had in all respects as though an information had been made against the person so arrested for hawking or peddling without license, and a warrant had upon such information been issued by such Justice and he had been arrested thereunder; and if upon the hearing such person shall prove that he at the time of the arrest had such license duly issued to him as by this Act provided, such Justice shall, notwithstanding, make a conviction against him, and thereby impose a fine not exceeding five dollars for refusing to exhibit such license to the Constable, in case it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Justice that the person so arrested had neglected or refused upon request to exhibit such license. neglected or refused upon request to exhibit such license: such fine, when recorded, shall be paid to the constable who made the acrest. Section 4—Provides that every person who shall peddle without having in his actual possession a license, shall be liable to a penalty of not
