PARIS LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent) Paris, France, Sept 3, 1900 Whatever may be said of the decadence of French art as expressed in literature or painting, no sign thereof may be seen in the form which refers to the designing of costumes. In dressmaking as well as in cooking, the French are still pre-eminent. The gowne displayed at the present exhibition draw such crowds of female worshippers, that they frequently have to stand in line for hours, waiting a chance to approach the glass cases. In the invention of new shades and the combination of old ones, in the discovery of movel effects in draperice and outlines, the Parisians bave long been famous; and in these cases may be seen illustrations of their best productions, as well as details which indicate what the styles of the coming sesson will be. The

French dresemaker approaches an embryo costume with seriouspess and even reverence, and the result seems to justify bis attitude. There are not a few povelties in the expo sition. Ose of the couturiers famous for making the Parisian women the pre tiest dolls in the world, has refused to use wax figures on which to display his creations. 


