## Local & Foreign Items.

Horses were dropping dead in the streets  
of New York, last week, on account of the  
great heat.

In the English House of Commons, a law  
was passed last week forbidding the export-  
ation of arms and ammunition to China  
under severe penalties.

Of the 46,088 deaths which occurred in  
Paris, in 1899, as many as 13,814 are at-  
tributed to tuberculosis, or more than one  
fourth.

Some idea of the way they do business in  
Aroostook county, Me., may be gathered  
from the fact that Mr. Powers, of Carleton,  
lately placed an order for five carloads of po-  
tato diggers.

The Boer's idea of independence includes  
freedom to "wallow his nigger," and shoot  
him if he "chinks."

It is estimated that the productive cap-  
acity of the labor saving machinery in the  
United States is now equal to a hardworking  
population of 400,000,000.

Coal is worked so easily in China that in  
Shanghai it sells at less than one shilling per  
ton at the mines.

A New York man has turned out his one  
hundred and twenty seventh patented inven-  
tion. This latest invention consists of a  
finger ring that cuts twine and cranes marks  
on a package.

The world's births amount to 36,790,000  
every year, 100,800 every day, 4,300 every  
hour, 70 every minute, or one and a fraction  
every second.

It is stated that more than two thousand  
Mormons have come into Canada from Utah  
during the last two years.

The Methodist has 132 missionaries in  
China; the Presbyterians, 300; and the  
American Board of Commissioners for For-  
eign Missions, 110.

The late Major Gordon, killed in the war  
last week, had \$10,000 life insurance, which  
he had placed the day before he left Halifax  
for South Africa.

General Sir George White was presented  
with a thoroughbred Irish charger, fully  
equipped, at the late Balmoral Show  
Grounds, Belfast. The presentation was  
subscribed for by the working classes, who  
were present in large numbers, and accorded  
the hero of Ladysmith an enthusiastic wel-  
come.

London, July 24.—The supplementary ses-  
sion, commenced by the prolongation of the  
work in South Africa, amount to \$11,  
500,000, making a total of \$24,500,000  
voted for this purpose and bringing the total  
sum estimated up to \$75,000,000.

The Sumnerville, P. E. I., Agricultural show  
the army horse made its appearance at
