# The Gold of the Rand.

At a time when all eyes are on South Africa a few particulars of the mineral wealth which brought utterance to the Transvaal will prove of interest. Wonderful, indeed, are these great "Witwatersrand" goldfields of the South African Republic. The Dutch word "Witwatersrand" means literally "white water range," and the strip of territory a few hundred miles long and a few miles in width to which it is applied was but a few years ago considered a nearly worthless ridge, useful only for the pasturing of cattle and sheep, and for even this comparatively valuable. In 1883, however, gold was discovered, and in 1884 the value of the gold production was about £10,000,000, increasing with startling rapidity, the production of 1888 being about £10,000,000; that of 1890, £20,000,000; 1892, over £40,000,000; 1895, over £80,000,000, and 1897, about £110,000,000 in each year.

This wonderful development attracted to South Africa thousands of people in the hope of realizing quick fortunes. Development, however, showed that the mines could only be successfully worked by the use of costly machinery, and while they have been, and are, being worked by the use of costly machinery, they were not of such character as to make hand or placer mining profitable as was the case in California. The gold production in the Rand since 1884 has been over £60,000,000, and careful surveys of the field by the use of drills and other processes have shown beyond question that the "right" probably amounts to hundreds of millions sterling, while the large number of mines which have been located in adjacent territories, particularly in the province of Rhodesia, give promise of additional supplies, so that it seems probable that South Africa will still trade away gold producing sections of the world. It is a wonderful fact to believe that these wonderfully rich mines are the last of the "gold" of the Rand. ## The Arctic Mosquito.

I heard stories of children being stung to death and can readily believe them.

"Whenever we went ashore we wore heavy hats and took up our mosquito netting, but were certain to suffer more or less. One of our party cut the tongue out of his nose, and a narrow line of sock was exposed under the lining. Next day he was better, but there at least a hundred times, and his feet were so terribly itched that the shoes had to be cut off.

"Another man, a Frenchman in the boat crew, got drunk on Alaska whisky one afternoon and lay down to take a nap in a corner of the engine room. I noticed him a little later and was horrified at the sight of a little mass of mosquitoes that had settled on a small exposed section of his cheek and throat. In about four hours his face was swollen to twice its natural size, and he was unable to swallow and was burned with fever. It was a week before he was able to go about. I saw a number of cattle and sheep that had been made stonely blind by stings near the eye.
