The theory that bovine tuberculosis is communicable to human beings through the consumption of dairy products has heap varies, and when the whole 12 rise together at noon and midnight the spectacle been rapped lately from many quarters, says the New York Post. Dr Theobald Smith of Harvard university, who has been making experiments in this matter for several years, declares that certain differences exist between bovine and human tubercle bacilli, and that thus far he has not found the bacilli identical in any instance.
