VICTIMS OF THE COCAINE HABIT.

Recent tragic events have revealed something of the growth of the most deadly form of narcotism known -the cocaine habit. Not long since this was quite unknown in London, says a writer, in a London paper. To-day every busy West End chemist can tell stories of its victims who flock to him.

The first alarm of the growth of the cocaine habit came from New York about fourteen years ago. But as late as 1894 the then leading authority on inebriety in this country was able to declare that only very few cases were known here.

Now cocaine injection has firmly established itself in London, not among the common people, but among the cleverest men and women. It can be carried on so secretly that for a time even the this new habit presents.

Let the average man inject a dose of morphia and he will find the temporary ease followed by excruciating headache, by raw nerves, and by fearsome depression of spirits. But with the cocaine at first there is none of this. You feel young and vigorous again. Pain is deadened. The things that troubled you seem swept out of your life. You have a at first no great reaction, although in this, as in every nerve poison, the effects differ according to individual

> temperament. But the pleasure passes off very quickly, even more quickly than with opium, and the victim is almost inevitably driven to renew the injection. In many cases from twelve to twenty doses are before long taken in a single day. This costs money. Cocaine hydrochlorate, the form of the drug used for this purpose, is very expensive. Wholesale, it costs twenty-five shillings an ounce, and retail usually about three times as much. In one known case a man spends as much as ten shillings a day on his cocaine.

The first harmful result seen is often enough not physical, but moral. Cocaine, even more than morphia, destroys the moral sense. This is no figure of speech, but a plain statement of an observed and bard. undeniable fact. The cocaine fiend Nerviline, the best household lini- does not become violent or brutal. On the contrary, he seems more gentle and more refined than ever before. His artistic perceptions are in every way quickened. But though he has hitherto been scrupulously honest, he will now often steal without shame. He often seems to forget the meaning of truth. It is yet a moot point with psychologists how and why this destruction of the moral sense is accomplished. But that it is accomplished admits of no denial.

KLEPTOMANIACS.

Many of the cases of kleptomania which excite so much surprise, and many of the unaccountable crimes among well-to-do people, are solely due to this. As one chemist put it somewhat bluntly to me: "When a person comes in here and asks for cocaine or morphia or chloral, I, of course, fill in the doctor's prescrip- New York, 144. tion. So much has the habit grown that a new industry has sprung up in England during the past few years, the establishment of "homes" for wellto-do narcotists. These homes are not usually registerd under any Act. Many of them do not advertise, but are supplied with patients by their private connection of doctors. Others advertise as regularly in medical papers as great hotels do in ordinary organs.



The Canning of Fruits.

In the early work of excavation at Pompeii, in the pantry of one of the old and mostly destroyed palaces, an earthen vessel was found which, when opened, showed a quantity of well preserved figs. Examination proved that they had been cooked and put into the vessel while hot. The cover had a small aperture through which the steam escaped and drove out the air also. The aperture was then securely closed with wax, and the fruit remained sweet for twenty centuries. From this arose the modern practice of canning fruits, vegetables and meats.

By the government of the Province of Quebec school books are now distributed gratuitously. From 668 school districts and 80 convents applications for first books to the number of 95,267 have been made.
