THE LATE COL. RAYMOND.

We regret to announce the death of Colonel Charles W. Raymond, which occurred at his residence in the Parish of Woodstock on Monday evening at about midnight from paralysis. He was in his usual good health on Sunday and attended divine service both morning and evening.

On Monday morning he dressed himself and laid down in his room, where he was found shortly afterwards by a member of the family in an unconscious state, from which he never rallied.

He was born and lived all his life in Woodstock and was in his 81st year at the time of his decease. More than 50 years ago he married Miss Carman, of St. Marys, who died in 1893. The family consisted of Rev. W. O. Raymond, the well-known Episcopal clergyman of St. John; C. L. S. Raymond, Arthur J. Raymond and Miss Bessie who still survive, and a deceased daughter Mrs. C. H. Perkins.

He always took a great interest in the militia of the county with which he was connected from boyhood until he retired from the command of the 67th Regiment, about 13 years ago.

In religion he was a member of the Episcopal church, and no church ever had a more faithful and consistent adherent than was Col. Raymond. He was ever ready to contribute of his time and means for the benefit of his church and his example for good will live in the memory of his friends and acquaintances for many many years yet to come.

In politics he was a staunch Liberal and there, too, by his example, he was a tower of strength.

He was a kind and loving father, a good neighbor, a Christian gentleman, and, in every respect, a model man. It is a pity the world did not possess more men of the same stamp.

His remains were interred at the Parish church, Wednesday afternoon.

Death of William Currie.

William Currie, a prominent farmer of North Richmond, died at his home about two miles from Richmond Corner, on Saturday night, at the age of 64 years. He had been sick about a week and died of acute inflammation of the stomach. He leaves a wife, two sons, Edward, who lives at home, and another son who is in the United States, and two brothers, Robert and Andrew, who live in North Richmond, and one sister, Mrs. Ivory Kilburn, who is now in Vancouver. The funeral took place Tuesday.

An Ancient Law Suit.

A lawsuit was tried in the Police Court on Thursday last week, of more than usual interest.

The plaintiff was Edmund L. Ebbett, administrator of the estate of Elijah Ebbett, late of Simonds, deceased vs. LeBaron L. Moore. It was for the recovery of the value of a \$100.00 note given by Mr. Moore to Mr. Ebbett in November, A. D., 1875.

Mr. Moore appeared in person and by his counsel, and swore that he received the money from Mr. Ebbett and had never paid it, but as it was more than six years ago he refused to pay any portion of it. The Police Magistrate was therefore compelled to grant a non-suit.

The moral: collect your debts from some people before they pass the six year limit.

Messrs. LaBillois and Farris.

Hon Charles H. LaBillois, Chief Commissioner of Public Works, and Hon L. P. Farris, Commissioner of Agriculture, were in Woodstock on Thursday last week—Mr. Farris to inspect the factory of the Carleton Creamery company and Mr. LaBillois to see what was needed in the way of repairs to roads and bridges in this vicinity.

The County Council had asked the government for the use of the Diamond drill for the purpose of boring into the ground in some places in our county to see what could be found in the way of minerals or oil. Mr. LaBillois said there were two localities ahead of us with their applications but as soon as they had been served Carleton would have the drill.

Mr. Farris said the government had granted a bonus to Mr. Britton's mill at Bristol, on Mr. Britton having given bonds to put in a steam power before the 1st of January next.

Messrs. Farris and LaBillois left on the express, on Friday, for Andover, where they would look over the

highway bridge and decide if it should be torn down at once to avoid danger to life. They would also inspect the creamery and the roller mill at that town.

At Edmundston there was the opening of a new road to look into, and some enquiries to be made into the enforcement of the liquor law. From Edmundston they intend to go up to Connor's station.
