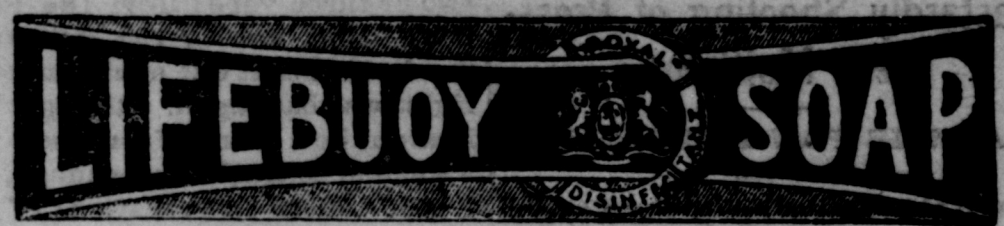

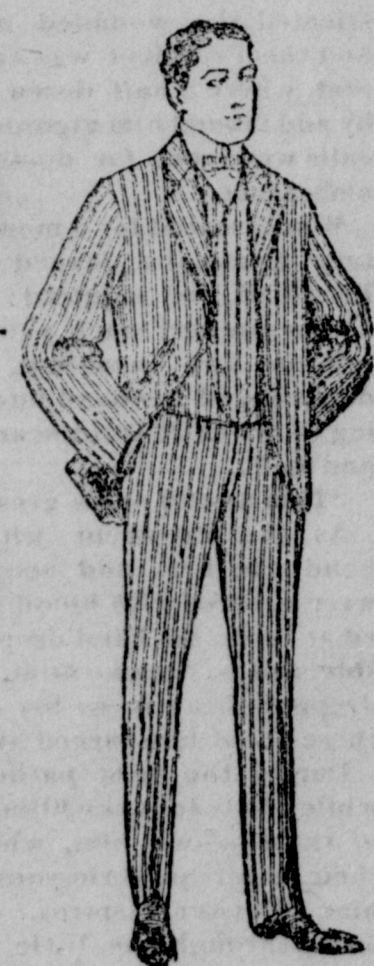

The Plenishing of a Bride.

That the bride shall leave her father's house with some store of goods, is the general custom in all lands, and has been the fashion of the world in all ages. In the Hebrew story of Othniel and Achsah, told in the book of Judges, we find Achsah dowered by her father with the meadow land watered by the upper and nether springs, no mean setting out in a pastoral country where the herds and flocks needed good grazing and fresh water. The bride in our country furnishes the linen for her beds and tables, and is provided with an outfit of clothing sufficient to last her for at least a year. Often she does much more than this. A well-to-do father sometimes bestows on his daughter the gift of a home, either building or buying a house for her, and furnishing it from attic to cellar. But if means are limited and the bride and the groom must begin in a very small way, let them not on that account be deterred from housekeeping. The very tiniest bit of a home, the most frugal furnishing is far to be preferred by the newly married pair to living in a boarding house or hotel, where the young wife leads a life of idleness, and the husband sits with her at a public table. Privacy is one of the requisites to successful home making at the start, and this should not be sacrificed to a foolish desire for display or to show of any description.

The real needs for a home are few and simple. A bedroom, a living-room and a kitchen are ample for two people. Parlors of the old type, where the best carpet and the best furniture are set away, and used only on great occasions, are not very much in fashion now, and most people prefer a pleasant apartment where they may dine, chat, have book and plants, and receive their friends—a refined living room.

Influences Tending Towards Freer Trade.

Several causes are tending towards the promotion of freer trade among our neighbors. Some of these causes are thus stated by Saturday Evening Post: "One result of the benefactions of the millionaires is rather curious, but perfectly plain and reasonable. Mr. Schwab, for instance, joined the noble band of givers, and for a while was handing out money by the thousands and tens of thousands. Mr. Carnegie is still far ahead in the size and frequency of his bestowals. Other gentlemen connected with the Steel Trust do not mind the number of laughs they place upon their checks. It is a demonstration of generosity without precedent in history. Naturally it follows that money so freely given must come from extraordinary opportunities, and thus the public is learning a fact which the steel magnates are proving by their own action; that they are enjoying golden privileges under the tariff legislation of the United States. The matter is further clinched by the United States steel manufacturers who sell steel, after paying the large sums in freight, to English customers for less than they will sell it in the home market. Out of these conditions something interesting should certainly come. President McKinley seems to realize the impending difficulties, and his idea, as intimated by his friends, is to obviate any open antagonisms by the extension of reciprocity agreements, and by the gradual amelioration of the more acute differences that now separate us from unrestricted trading with other nations, at the same time taking all care to give full protection to our own people. Altogether it is a mixed-up affair, and the statesman who can lead the way through the labyrinth will deserve all the fame that can crown success."

Lit by Chimney-Pots.

A Belgian engineer residing in England has discovered a method by which smoke can be turned into light. In operating his device the inventor collects the smoke from any kind of a fire and forces it into a receiver. It is then saturated with hydro-carburet, and a brilliant light results. The method is simplicity itself, and its discoverer is now at work upon a simple apparatus which can be attached to any chimney to bring about the desired result, so that at night-time, instead of a dense cloud of black smoke being emitted from the chimney-tops a bright light will take its place. The apparatus is already at work in London, and its general adoption is probable, and highly desirable.
