GRAIN FOR CALVES.

Discussing the proper amount of grain to feed calves, The Breeders' Gazette recently said: In the matter of the amount of grain which any farm animal can take, a great deal depends upon previous feeding and the manner in which they are brought up to take grain. Calves which have had ro grain should be given a very small quantity at first and the amount increased as the animals digest and utilize it proper-Such calves should be started a daily allowance of not over three quarters of a pound of grain er hundred pounds live weight. A Remedy for Scours.

A remedy for scours, given by Flint in 'Milch Cows and Dairy Farming,' is two drachms prepared chalk or one ounce magnesia, 10 grains powdered opium, one-half drachms powchest with Polson's Nerviline. Don't dered catechu, two drachms tincture effective, give two scruples Dover' powders, one ounce starch or powdered arrowroot, one drachm cinnamon powder, and one-half drachm powdered kino. Boil the starch or arrowroot in water until it thickens, and, when cold, stir in the other ingredients and give morning and night. It is a good plan to keep a lump of chalk constantly before calves, as it corrects acidity of the
