### SUBSTITUTES FOR THE SALOON.

In a recent number of the *New York Independent*, Mr. Melendy has a valuable article on the topic quoted at the head of this editorial. It is an article which every worker in the cause of temperance—nay, every worker in the cause of humanity's uplift—should read. Its suggestions are most valuable and timely, not alone for the negative side of the problem, that of saving men from vice—the "thou shalt not" of prohibition—but also for the positive side, that of developing their higher natures, and lifting them into nobler lives. His "substitutes" are calculated not alone to keep men out of saloons, but, having kept them out, to provide means for their growth and development.

We urged upon our constituency the fact that we had done only half our duty when we secured the abolition of the canteen as a dispenser of intoxicants; that the other half, the positive side of our duty, was quite as important, the substitution of a canteen with all of the good, minus the evil, of the beer canteen. Precisely the same arguments hold for the establishment of an institution which shall embody all of the good features of the modern saloon and additional ones, without the soul-destroying evils to whose service the good is prostituted.

But, while approving the effort to provide substitutes for the saloon, we feel compelled to sound a warning against the mistake into which there is reason to fear some will fall—the mistake of confining their efforts to this side of the problem. If it is a mistake to work only for the abolition of the saloon, it is no less a mistake to work only for substitutes for the saloon. A substitute for the saloon is an excellent thing, but it must be a substitute, not a mere rival institution. The battle may be half won when institutions are established which supply the many needs enumerated by Mr. Melendy, which are now supplied alone by the shrewd and versatile saloon, but we shall still have a battle of no small size on our hands if the saloon remains as the competitor of those institutions.

We have no sympathy with the doctors of divinity mentioned by Mr. Melendy, who think they have accounted for the situation when they have said that "men are depraved." We know that it is not mere love of vice and desire to be evil that lures men into the saloon, but we also know that "call it depravity or what you will, there is something in every one that makes it downhill work to do wrong and hard, uphill work to do right." We also know that outward temptations which appeal to the evil principle within, greatly increase human vice and human suffering. It is our business to do what we can to make it easy for men to do right and hard for them to do wrong. The evil tendency within the human heart, divine grace alone can conquer, but we can do much to so change the outward conditions that they shall cease to develop that evil tendency and that they shall rather nourish the divine spark which also glows in every human breast. There are two ways of doing this, one the way so ably advocated by Mr. Melendy, that of providing opportunities for the development of the higher aspirations, the other, equally necessary, that of removing the agencies which excite the evil passions of men and lure them to destruction.

The absolute need there is of this work of removing temptation is made clear by the fact that the victims of the saloon are not confined to the destitute classes. Without doubt thousands of people are driven to the saloon by the want of light, warmth, food, social life and innumerable other of the commonest human needs which they have not the means to satisfy elsewhere, but multitudes of others become *habitues* of the saloon who have no lack of any of these things until the saloon has reduced them to penury. Moreover, in prohibition states, even without substitutes for the saloon, drunkenness is greatly decreased, though without doubt the results would be more satisfactory if such substitutes accompanied prohibition. By all means provide substitutes for the saloon. It is a work to which the Christian Church may well devote its energies, not alone for the negative purpose of keeping its young people out of the saloon, but also, and much more, that it may develop their social, literary and aesthetic

natures and make them more efficient workers for the Master. But whatever else we do, let us not be deluded into abating our efforts to destroy the saloon. For the saloon is something more than an open door to hell. If it were that alone, you might put up your signboard to warn men not to enter and leave it. It is not merely a door which men may enter or not as they choose. It is also a trap, cunningly devised and baited to deceive them into entering. Around its entrance wait arch fiends clad as angels of light; within are many harmless pleasures, many substantial benefits, but all serve the ultimate purpose of luring the victims to death. It is not enough to set over against this institution of the evil one a counter attraction, be it never so attractive. The powers of darkness are not so easily overcome. The reign of the saloon will be broken only when the saloon itself is destroyed.

### Agricultural.

#### GRAIN FOR CALVES.

Discussing the proper amount of grain to feed calves, *The Breeder's Gazette* recently said: In the matter of the amount of grain which any farm animal can take, a great deal depends upon previous feeding and the manner in which they are brought up to take grain. Calves which have had no grain should be given a very small quantity at first and the amount increased as the animals digest and utilize it properly. Such calves should be started on a daily allowance of not over three quarters of a pound of grain per hundred pounds live weight. When the animals are utilizing this properly, then it may be increased to from 1 to 1½ pounds, according to the character of the animals, the nature of the roughage supplied, etc.

Here is a case where the eye of the master must guide the hand which deals the feed. Enough corn is wasted each fall in the middle west by our stockmen to run all the agricultural newspapers in America on a higher plan than they are now being operated and still a good margin would be left for those who are conducting these operations. The mere feeding of grain liberally will not make cattle of a desirable class nor fatten them economically. Feeding is an art and must be learned often by dearly bought experience.

#### Demand for Improved Stock.

Every farmer familiar with stock interests is aware of the active demand at the present time for cattle of the improved breeds. This is the case not only in our own state but also abroad throughout the land. Here in this state everything in the line of the meat-making breeds that could be reached has been sought out by purchasers and taken to their farms. At the same time, in the interior of the country, prices made at auction sales of Herefords and Short Horns have reached averages higher than ever before known in large transactions. These values have a sound basis to rest upon. Choice animals, select animals are wanted among stock growers all over the country with which to multiply good cattle to meet the increasing demand. It is a fact of great significance that there are 10,000,000 less cattle in the country at the present time than in 1892. In that time our population has increased by upwards of 10,000,000 people. During these years, and in the face of this increase of consumers the supply has been reduced over a million a year. This is a fact of great moment to the stock industry. It means something to so check this decrease as to change the situation to a condition of keeping good the annual supply, to say nothing of restoring the ratio of supply of eight years ago. In '92 we had 862 head of cattle to every 1000 inhabitants. In 1900 this had fallen to 585 to 1000 people. To even maintain the present ratio it is seen that we must increase the supply of cattle over 1,000,000 a year. Under any conceivable conditions this cannot be done for a long time to come. There is nothing in sight to prevent a further rise in the price of beef and an increase in the demand for improved cattle with which to multiply the animals.

It is thus seen that the present demand for cattle has a substantial basis to rest upon. The consumption of beef by our own people is sure to increase, while the call abroad for our cattle or the products of our slaughtering establishments in no event can be less than at the present time, and in all probability will greatly increase as the years go on. The farmer who now stocks his farm with improved cattle, therefore, is certainly on the right line of effort. Choice heaves brought in Chicago last week \$6.25 a hundred live weight. At that price they pay well for the growing anywhere. The outlook for good cattle is inviting.

#### A Remedy for Scours.

A remedy for scours, given by Flint in 'Milk Cows and Dairy Farming,' is two drachms prepared chalk or one ounce magnesite, 10 grains powdered opium, one-half drachm powdered catechu, two drachms tincture of capsicum, and five drops essence of peppermint, given twice a day in milk or gruel. In case this is not effective, give two scruples Dover's powders, one ounce starch or powdered arrowroot, one drachm cinnamon powder, and one-half drachm powdered kino. Boil the starch or arrowroot in water until it thickens, and when cold, stir in the other ingredients and give morning and night. It is a good plan to keep a lump of chalk constantly before calves, as it corrects acidity of the stomach.

A European Combine Against the United States.

Springfield Republican: The talk of a trade coalition among European nations against the United States impressed very profoundly the former Assistant Secretary of the United States Treasury, Mr. Vanderlip, who has lately returned from a journey through the leading European countries. He made it a point to visit financiers and Finance Ministers in various capitals, and get their views. And this is Mr. Vanderlip's conclusion: "I think it not only possible, but highly probable, that Europe can and will agree to binding terms of trade combination against us within the next few years, and that the result will be the most gigantic and stubborn commercial war in the history of the world. As most of our commercial treaties expire in 1903, I look for the real beginning of the war then in a refusal of most of the Continental nations to renew those conventions."

American papers are commenting on the fact that while United States exports, for the fiscal year just closed, reached the enormous total of 1,500,000,000, South America took less than 3 per cent of the whole. On the other hand, Canada and Mexico combined, Canada of course taking more than Mexico, took 15 per cent. The fact is causing some of the American papers to discuss reciprocity more earnestly than they have yet done; but others, instead of urging means to improve the market at their doors, are advising that special attention be given to the development of trade with South America. The *Chicago Record-Herald*, for example, says: "It is just as clear now as it was to the mind of the late James G. Blaine that South America holds vast trade opportunities for the producers of the United States—particularly the manufacturers—and that the efforts of our diplomacy and statecraft should be turned in the direction of cultivating closer trade relations with that part of our own hemisphere."
