RUM TRAFFIC NOTES.

A CYCLONE.

The track of the rum shop is the path of a cyclone around the world, and in that wide swath of death are the wreckage of homes and hopes, the bodies of dead and dying men and women, young men and maidens and children, slain in guilt and innocence alike.

A PROPHECY.

The men of the rum traffic see its overthrow coming, if temperance men are faithful. The *Liquor Trade Review* says: "Both prohibition and local option, liberty curtailing ideas and plans are gaining ground with the people, especially country towns and villages. If the present ratio of progress is made during the next twenty years, we shall expect to see, if alive, the liquor trade confined to the larger cities." It is to be hoped the *Review* correctly estimates the drift of this.

A NATION'S WASTE.

This is the way an exchange utters its indictment against the drinking habit of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales: "The United Kingdom, last year, spent for alcoholic drinks about \$800,000,000, which is equal to the total rental of all lands and houses in those islands; it is twice as much as was spent on bread, ten times as much as was spent on education, and eighty times as much as the Christians of the United Kingdom spent on foreign missions." Such a record should cover the people of the United Kingdom with humiliation; but it is not any worse than that of our own fair land.

IS IT RIGHT?

Is it right to preach salvation to men and women and then vote to perpetuate an institution that brings damnation to them?

Is it right to teach your boy to be honest and then vote to license a place where he may be taught to gamble?

Is it right to teach your boy to restrain his passions and then vote to license a place where his worst passions will be inflamed?

Does it show good sense to build churches to save men and license run hells to destroy them?

Is it right to preach justice and charity and then vote to license a thing to rob wives and children of their bread and bring lasting disgrace and misery upon them?

ECONOMICS OF DRINK.

Suppose four farmers came into town, each with \$30 in his pocket. One goes to a dry goods store, one to a hardware store, one to a boot and shoe store, and the other to a saloon, and each spends his money in the place he visits.

After two weeks I come to you and say: "Let us go and see those producers; see what they have received for the money they gave those non-producers." We drive to the home of the man who spent his money at the dry goods store. "What did you get?" "Do you see that dress which Nellie is wearing and the coat that Tom has on? Well, I gave the merchant \$30, and he gave me in exchange these things. He is better off; we are better off." Exchange of value; both are benefitted.

We go to the man who traded at the hardware store, and we say, "What did you receive?" "Do you see the stove, and the axe, and those kettles?" "Yes," "Well, I gave him \$30, and he gave me these. We are better off; he is better off."

We go to the man who spent his money at the boot and shoe store. "What did you receive for the money you paid?" "You see these boots which I am wearing, and the shoes Nellie has on and the boots that Will, Dick and Harry, and the rest, are wearing? I gave that merchant \$30 for them. We needed the boots and shoes, he needed the money, and we traded." An exchange of value; both are benefitted.

Now we go to the man who spent the \$30 in the saloon and say to him, "Sir, you paid that non-producer \$30. What did you get back?" "Come here and I will show you." Will he say that? No, he will hang his head and say, "I got this flaming nose, those bleared eyes, and have been sick ever since."

"My farmer friend, would you not have been better off if you had put the \$30 in the fire and burned it, and never had gone to the drinking place at all? Yes, because you would have had a clear head, hard muscles and could have gone to work at once and produced more wealth to take the place of that destroyed. The liquor dealer took your money and unfitted your brain and muscles for the production of more wealth."

Agricultural.

Echoes of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association Held at Fredericton in January Last.

Hon. L. P. Farris, Commissioner for Agriculture: Felt that the province was making progress along agricultural lines, and that the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association had contributed not a little to this.

The increased interest taken in the development of the dairy industry is now showing good results. Last year, 1900, there was an increase of 4 new cheese factories, 2 being located in York County and 2 in Madawaska. Many of the old factories have had numerous improvements made, thus enabling them to make a finer quality of cheese.

The total quantity of cheese made in 1900 was 1,882,432 pounds, or an increase over last year's output of 225,000 pounds. Reports from abroad confirm the statement that the quality has been improved.

This, in addition to the advance in price of about two-thirds of a cent per pound, is very encouraging. Our exports the present season amounted to 1,184,323 pounds, a gain over the exports of the previous year of nearly 75,000 pounds. The total value of the cheese manufactured in the province amounted to the sum of \$189,706.44 or \$32,200.91 more than last season.

The development of the butter industry is also very encouraging. This season we have 33 factories in operation, patronized by 1,200 people; in 1899 we had 25 factories patronized by 861 people. These new creameries are located in Kings, Westmorland, Madawaska and Victoria counties. "When I speak of factories I am including the skimming stations as well. The gain made this year in the output of the creameries amounts to nearly half a million pounds, this increase alone amounting to \$36,125.00. The total value of our dairy products now amount to the sum of \$284,325."

He was satisfied that what the province needs is more co-operation and more education along agricultural lines. It needs an education to farm successfully. The Government is anxious to assist the farmers of this province in any way possible.

HORSE BREEDING.

F. E. Cane, Montreal: No place on the American continent can raise better horses or raise them more profitably than can the maritime provinces. There is a profitable demand for good horses in the United States and even in Canada. Too much attention has been given to pedigree, and to breeding fast trotters, and too little care to getting a good action, good appearing carriage horse. The average farmer cannot afford to engage in the game of breeding fast horses. He can afford to raise good carriage horses. The farmer should keep the horse four or five years and then sell him at a good average and a good paying price. At the Horse Show at New York last fall Canadian raised horses took many of the leading prizes and sold at prices ranging from \$1,000 to \$1,500. By concentrated effort New Brunswick will take a foremost place as the home of the horse raiser and horse buyer.

EXPORT OF HAY.

Hon. Mr. Fisher: Stated that the Imperial conditions were that nothing but clover and timothy should be contained in the hay shipped to South Africa. While many offers to supply hay were received only a comparatively small portion was suitable for export. 2,000 tons were bought in New Brunswick and sent to South Africa. When it reached South Africa the Imperial authorities complained that it was too loosely pressed and in too large bundles. The new conditions are that hay for the War Office must now be put up in 100 pound bales and so compressed that one ton will not occupy more than 100 cubic feet of space. There is only one hay press in Canada capable of filling these conditions, and he feared that the export of hay for the war office had about ceased.

MILK PRODUCTION

A. E. Plummer, Advocated proper care of the cows, not necessarily pure bred cows. The cows should be kept in warm stables as free as possible from the draughts. They should be fed liberally. In the winter he fed half a bushel pulped turnips and mashed buckwheat twice a day. He fed hay and oat straw. He fed his cows at regular hours every day and milked them at regular hours. He weighed the milk every day and that from every cow separately. He urged this upon the farmers, as by this means a record can be kept of every cow. He kept a careful record of the milk and butter production of each of the 10 cows kept by him, and they produced on an average 300 pounds of butter during the year, which at 20

What Is the "Vatican"?

The term refers to a collection of buildings on one of the seven hills of Rome, which covers a space of 1200 feet in length and 1000 feet in breadth. It is built on the spot once occupied by the gardens of Nero.

About the year 1160, Pope Eugenius built it on a magnificent scale. Innocent II., a few years afterward, gave it up as a lodging to Peter II., King of Aragon. In 1305, Clement V., at the urging of the king of France, removed the Papal See from Rome to Avignon, when the Vatican remained in a state of obscurity and neglect for more than 70 years. But soon after the return of the Pontifical court to Rome, which finally took place in 1376, the Vatican was put into a state of repair again, enlarged and it was thenceforward considered the regular residence and palace of the Popes, who, one after the other, added fresh buildings to it, and gradually enriched it with antiquities, statues, pictures and books, until it became the richest depository in the world.

The Library of the Vatican was commenced 1450 years ago. It contains 40,000 manuscripts, among which are some by Pliny, St. Thomas, St. Charles Borromeo and many Hebrew, Syrian, Arabian and Armenian Bibles. The whole of the buildings composing the Vatican are filled with statues found beneath the ruins of ancient Rome, with paintings by the masters and curious medals and antiquities of every description.

Dr. Maag, who was in charge, was unable to maintain life, however. The patient had died from typhoid fever, and Dr. Maag decided to try an experiment. Respiration had ceased completely and the body was cold. Direct massage of the heart was resorted to. The chest was cut open directly over the heart, and through the incision the physician passed his hand and seized the heart. He commenced a series of compressions, and in a short time the heart commenced to work of its own accord. The action of the heart gradually became stronger, but the man had not commenced to breathe. Only after the heart had been acting half an hour did the first gasp for air come.

The patient was then assisted in this for about an hour until finally he was able to breathe quite freely. At the same time his cheeks began to assume a natural color. He lay in this condition another half hour, but without regaining consciousness or appearing to feel the effects of the incision. Then there was a reaction and respiration ceased, although the heart continued to act eight hours longer. A second effort was made to induce heart action, but without result.

China Rich in Coal Deposits.

China contains some of the richest coal deposits in the world. Last fall Professor Drake, of Tien-tsin, visited the coal fields in the province of Shansi, which were examined by Baron von Richthofen in 1870, and found that they are of immense extent. The coal area is said to be greater than that of Pennsylvania and the anthracite coal alone contained in these fields has been estimated at 630,000,000 tons. The Shansi coal beds are so thick and lie so uniformly in a horizontal position that the practicability has been suggested of running long lines of railroad tunnels through the beds so that the cars can be loaded in the mines all ready for distant transportation.
