Minutes of last day's session of January Council read and approved.

The following communications from Auditor Hoyt, who was too ill to attend, were read and, on motion, ordered laid on the table:—

Andover, July 1, 1901.

To His Worship the Warden and the Municipal Council, Victoria Co.

Gentlemen—Shortly after the session of the Council in January I was requested by two gentlemen of the board to collate and revise the delinquent lists of the different parishes and put them in such form that they could be placed in the hands of the collectors for collection.

With the exception of one or two items, I have completed this work, but owing to illness I am unable to submit a formal report.

The gentlemen requesting this work suggested that I receive as compensation a sum equal to one per centum of the amount shown on the lists.

Might I respectfully request that provision be made by which I may receive the amount from the Sec-Treas as soon as the work is completed and the system put in operation.

Sec-Treas submitted his report as follows, which was, on motion, received and laid on the table:—

Andover, July 2, 1901.

To the Warden and Council:

Gentlemen—I beg to submit my semi-annual report as follows:

I had on hand January session \$1,575.84

And have received since 1,229.37

Making a total of receipts \$2,805.21

And have expended on account school drafts \$1,900.00

Contingencies 1,418.19

Leaving a balance on hand at this date of \$140.02

I have some communications to lay before you from the auditor who is confined to the house through illness.

I would also add that David Curry, who was licensed by this Council to run the Dorsey ferry in the year 1900 and was deprived from doing so by the government making it a free ferry and placing another man in charge, has brought action against the county for damages. I placed the matter in the hands of Mr. Stratton, Clerk of the Peace, which I trust will meet with your approval.

Moved by Tweeddale, seconded by Ryan, and ordered that the Sec-Treas be authorized to employ counsel in the suit of David J. Curry against the county, for damages re ferry at Dorsey's.

Coun Brymer said this session was starting off too quietly, and as he liked to have a clash he proposed making some trouble for Coun Spike.

That gentleman had been given a position in the Customs, the reward of all good Liberals. He (Brymer) was sorry he was not a Liberal so that he could partake of the rewards and get all the advantages that are going.

Coun Spike was one of the lucky number. He (Brymer) on a happy occasion some time ago, asked Coun Spike for the ice cream for the councillors and he got it; he was going to try again, and he would likely get what he asked for.

The county and parish were pleased with the actions of Coun Spike since he occupied a seat at the board. Now, that he has a life office, he must necessarily leave the Council—but then they all might be left at next election. He has a government position and they were just common councillors. They were all pleased with the promotion, and he would leave it to Coun Spike to name the nature of the treat, that he asked for, for himself and colleagues.

Coun Spike—This is amusing to begin with. The late speaker says I am lucky. Well, I think the duties of a councillor are of as much importance as any government job. The councillor's acts come direct to ourselves. The duties of the office now held were different. I will have to do my duty to the government and to the public. Every councillor knows that I in my official capacity would not like to cause any trouble among the people, but my duty to the government I must fulfill. As for the treat, if I dipped in pretty heavily,

people would find fault that I did not invite all my guests. But I propose to take the hint thrown out by Coun Brymer, and recognize, in some way, the good feeling entertained for me by the Council. I have been treated properly by all the members and have no ill-feeling against any councillor. I leave the board happily and yet with some regret in being compelled to separate from such good friends.

Coun Brymer—I am glad that Coun Spike has taken the hint, and I wish all other councillors would take hints as gracefully as he has done.

Coun Spike and his colleague Coun Manzer are two of the best councillors at the board. Their parish, Andover, stands in first class shape now, and it was not so when they were first elected to the board.

Coun Manzer—I am sorry that my colleague, Coun Spike, is compelled to not seek a re-election. He is a good councillor, and looks after the interest of his own parish as good as does any councillor at the board look after theirs.

Coun Tweeddale had been associated with Coun Spike since that gentleman was first elected, and when he said that Coun Spike was one of the best councillors who ever sat at the board, he spoke from experience. He (Tweeddale) had served longer than any councillor now present, and while he never claimed to have any more influence at the board than any other councillor, he took some credit to himself for the excellent showing made by the Council. They had no reason to be ashamed of the management of affairs in this county for five years or more. The strongest proof is the record of business transacted. The financial affairs have improved wonderfully. This county had been taken out of an embarrassed state and placed in as good a position, if not better, as any county in the province.

The Councillors should take credit for that fact, and each councillor had always exercised his best judgment on the questions under consideration. If a man entertains any spite against a brother councillor, he is too narrow to set as a member of this board. He was sorry that Coun Spike had to sever his connection with the board but, as Coun Brymer wisely said, he (Tweeddale) might have to at next election.

Formerly the parish of Andover was in a very bad condition. But, like Coun Spike, Coun Manzer was one of the most intelligent members of the board, and as a result that parish was now in a prosperous condition. He (Tweeddale) had no interest in political matters, but from his knowledge of Coun Spike, he believed that gentleman would please the public and perform his duties satisfactorily to all concerned.

Coun Manzer announced that the Andover Creamery company would hold a meeting in the afternoon, which would necessitate his absence for a few hours, and if it were possible, the Councillors were invited to attend the meeting.

Adjourned until 1 p. m. for dinner.

1 p. m. Council met pursuant to adjournment. Councillors all present except Manzer and Spike.

On motion the Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole on bills and accounts, Councillor Ryan in the chair.

Building Committee submitted the following report, which was received and adopted, and accounts recommended ordered paid.

We, your building committee, beg to submit the following report:—

We had some repairs made on jail closets, etc., and other repairing, including material, at a cost of \$15.95, and painting, whitening and oiling floors, \$3.50.

We would recommend the bills be paid and also recommend that the committee be empowered to procure one and a half dozen of chairs for the court room and window shades for same and have them in position before the meeting of next court.

The communications received from the auditor were taken from the table and fully discussed. A motion by Coun Ryan, that the Sec-Treas pay the auditor the amount agreed on

for arranging the delinquent list as soon as the work was satisfactorily performed, was opposed by several Councillors on the ground that paying a bill before the work was completed was establishing a wrong precedent, and, after a lengthy debate, the resolution and an amendment were both withdrawn and the following motion was passed unanimously: Moved by Tweeddale, seconded by Spike, that the auditor be instructed to complete the work of making up the delinquent lists, with the assurance that the Council will pay him the compensation agreed upon, at the next January session of the Council. Carried.

Moved by Tweeddale, seconded by Brymer, that in the event of Mr. Hoyt being unable to complete the delinquent lists, in three weeks from the present term, the Sec-Treas shall have the same completed and placed in the hands of the collectors. Carried.

Coun Spike—in view of what was said at the morning session, and carrying out my promise, I now extend an invitation to councillors, reporters and constable to attend a banquet to-morrow night at 8 o'clock. I mention the matter now so that the councillors will be prepared to answer the usual toasts, on that occasion.

Couns Tweeddale and Brymer called attention to errors in the published report of the proceedings of January session of Council.

Mr. Watts regretted that the mistakes had occurred, and he apologized for them. He asked that Coun Tweeddale specify the errors and make the corrections in writing.

Coun Tweeddale presented the following: In the discussion on Sec-Treas account it is stated that there was no vouchers for payments which should read "orders of council" instead of vouchers.

Another paragraph of the report states that any assessment on property, over \$1200 valuation in the County is illegal, which is general in its application; the statement only applies to a certain property in the County which was exempted from any valuation over that amount.

Another error with regard to order for poor assessment in the parish of Perth, reads \$350—and should read \$50.

Moved by Jenkins, seconded by Sadler, that Gilbert Blue be refunded \$216, overpaid taxes in the parish of Lorne and charged to said parish.

Coun Ryan did not quite understand how Mr. Blue came to pay twice and he asked the councillors from Lorne for an explanation.

Coun Jenkins—That was one of those mistakes which frequently occur in the delinquent tax list. Mr. Blue's brother paid the tax, but it came back on the delinquent list, and he paid it this time.

The commissioner highways, parish of Lorne, gave notice of a road laid out leading from great road near W. Johnston's to Oxbow.

On motion ordered that Ernest Hallett be appointed field driver and Gideon Rideout pound keeper for the parish of Drummond.

Adjourned until to-morrow at 10 a. m.

July 3d, 1901.

Council met pursuant to adjournment; all present; warden in chair. Minutes of first day's proceedings read and approved.
