

#### CANADA AND IRELAND.

They Make Characteristic and Attractive Exhibits at the Glasgow Exposition—Both in Physical juxtaposition.

Russia is not the only agricultural country which here enters the manufacturing lists. The Canadian contribution is equally comprehensive and scarcely less enterprising. All the products of the Dominion are represented, and visitors will be surprised at their variety and extent. Agriculture is most in evidence. It is illustrated very prettily by a lofty kiosk in the centre of the pavilion, decorated entirely from top to bottom with the cereals and grasses of Canada. These are supplied by 250 farmers, and arranged by the director of the central experimental farm. Then there are fruits, vegetables, cheeses, wines, flour, honey, canned goods, and so forth. But the manufactures will probably attract equal attention. One realizes that Canada is actually becoming a manufacturing country. It turns out paper, woolen, cotton, silk, rubber, leather, iron and wooden goods. The agricultural implements are, perhaps, the most noticeable examples. It is, I believe, a fact that Canada annually exports about 1,000 reaping machines to Germany. As to the mineral section, the wealth of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and British Columbia is displayed in a systematic fashion by their respective governments, and that of the Dominion as a whole is looked after by the central government at Ottawa. Forestry is similarly treated.

#### THE IRISH PAVILION.

The Irish pavilion, which stands hard by the Canadian, will attract universal attention by reason of its charming and characteristic exterior. It is designed by Mr. T. Manly Deane, and represents a small country house of Georgian period, at Malahide, standing in its own grounds. It is a low double-fronted house, with white concreted walls, rounded bow windows, and thatched roof. The "friendly" aspect—of this modest structure makes it conspicuous. The interior is divided into several rooms which are devoted to different branches of Irish industry. There are tweeds, linens, laces, basket work, Donegal carpets, wood carving, and models of ships from Belfast. Looms are being put up and will be at work. There was also some promise held out of a still at work, but I inquired after it in vain. Perhaps it is illicit, in order to make the national character complete. The Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, which is responsible for this pavilion, is to be congratulated on the result.—Catholic Union.



#### Artificial Legs, Eyes and Noses.

When a person loses a leg, an arm, an eye or a nose, he finds it very difficult to obtain employment, and often when he gets his missing organ

replaced he has to pretend that it is real. We happen to know a bank clerk with an artificial leg and a glass eye, whose most intimate friends are not aware that there is anything amiss with him. He walks a bit stiff, but everyone thinks it is due to rheumatism. Eyes are so perfectly made now that even a skillful doctor could not distinguish the false from the real.

When you want a glass eye well made you must go and have your measure taken, so to speak. It needs considerable skill to make it exactly like the sound one in size, shape and color. A properly-fitted eye moves just like the sound one. It is a bit expensive, costing anything from \$2 to \$5. They are made in left and right, grey, blue, brown and every other colour. The ordinary kinds are sold for a few shillings.

When a damaged natural eye has to be removed by a surgeon you have to go three weeks without having it replaced. By that time the cavity is ready to receive the glass substitute. The glass eye is very easily put in and taken out. Most people take it out at night with a little hook, holding their head over the bed so that it shall not fall on the floor. And to replace it in the morning they have only to raise the lid and slip it in. It is a bit troublesome, as it has to be washed every twelve hours.

In the old days they made the eyes of copper, wax, celluloid or vulcanite but the only material used now is glass. A glass eye lasts about two years; then it gets a bit rough, and has to be renewed. The trade is a big one, for at least 60,000 people in Britain wear them.

Artificial legs have been brought to a high state of perfection. We know scores of men doing work that require considerable activity, who use one or two artificial legs. It is as easy to get about on two as on one.

Though you can tell a false nose by close inspection you would never be able to distinguish it across the table at a dinner, for instance. A man without a nose can't possibly get employment, so that even the poorest people wear false ones when their own organs get bitten off or worn away with disease. Fancy a clergyman preaching without a nose! But it is curious how uncomfortable a man feels who has gone noseless for years and then has a false one fixed.

Noses are made of cork, and they are finished off to look exactly like the flesh. Of course the individual's face has to be studied. If he is naturally pale he requires to be provided with a pale nose, and if he is florid he is supplied with one of ruddy hue.

Ears, lips and cheeks are also made just like the original. But to make them well a man must not only be a sculptor, but a painter of no mean gifts.

#### The Richest Nation on Earth.

Despite her innumerable trusts and combines the United States is not the richest nation in the world. Neither is Great Britain.

The greatest average individual wealth is found in the Australian Commonwealth. Australia is a continental island, abundantly rich in land suitable for settlement and industry.

Moreover, its natural prosperity is dependent upon no single product, but embraces pastoral, agricultural and mining industries in almost equal degree, and to these are rapidly being added manufactures. Here are some figures worth bearing in mind. Last year the total value of the products of the Colonies forming the Australian Commonwealth amounted to fully \$110,000,000, to which total pastoral industries contributed \$30,000,000, agriculture \$28,000,000, mineral products \$20,000,000 (at least), and manufacturing and other industries the remaining \$32,000,000.

The wool alone from the 120,000,000 sheep raised in 1900 was worth \$20,000,000.

As for the mineral resources of Australia they cannot even be guessed at.

During the last eight-and-forty years the country has produced gold to the value of \$380,000,000, and during the last twenty silver to the value of \$30,000,000.

Again diamonds are to be found in one district and rubies in another, while there is at least one emerald mine in New South Wales, and opals equal to any in the world in Queensland.

Finally, the pearl fisheries of the northwestern coast produce a considerable portion of the most valuable pearls of commerce.

Thus, Australia, after having been in the hands of the white man for a hundred years or so, occupies the most enviable position of nations.

There are complete sets of tools used by the Roman smiths, carpenters and shoemakers, and an agriculturist's outfit.

Eleven boys and men from the poorer classes of Chicago were killed by one bolt of lightning Monday. They had been fishing in the lake, and sought shelter from a shower under the pier, which was struck. One 10-year-old boy was rescued alive from under the heap of dead bodies.
