THE despatch from Montreal in Mondays Globe that hereafter the C P R at Montreal would not accept freight for points on the I C R is believed to be the first announcement in connection with the Settlement of the dispute between the I C R and the CPR. No announcement of the reason for the new order has been received, but it is known that negotiations for a settlement of the whole difficulty were in progress, with every likelihood of a favorable termination. The new order means that the C P R will not be a competitor with the ICR for freight from Montreal for I C R points. Some compensating announcement may soon be expected, and in time the public will learn the whole arrangment. In the meantime it will be good news to St John people that the diffiulty is over and that hereafter there will only be good feeling between the two big lines.




