WE have allowed other matter to be crowded out of this issue in order to enable us to publish all the proceedings of the County Council in one paper. This proves more satisfactory than when continued in two issues. In the haste necessary to get the matter in this week, a few typographical and other mistakes have occurred, but they are so apparent that no harm can accrue.

The despatch from Montreal in Monday's Globe that hereafter the C.P.R. at Montreal would not accept freight for points on the I.C.R. is believed to be the first announcement in connection with the Settlement of the dispute between the I.C.R. and the C.P.R. No announcement of the reason for the new order has been received, but it is known that negotiations for a settlement of the whole difficulty were in progress, with every likelihood of a favorable termination. The new order means that the C.P.R. will not be a competitor with the I.C.R. for freight from Montreal for I.C.R. points. Some compensating announcement may soon be expected, and in time the public will learn the whole arrangement. In the meantime it will be good news to St. John people that the difficulty is over and that hereafter there will only be good feeling between the two big lines.

County Council.

The Councilors, on Tuesday, evidently meant business when they assembled in their June session. There was no time wasted, but little of lengthy speech making indulged in; due consideration was given to the questions of importance submitted, and the council adjourned *sine die*, the same day.

The Exhibition.

We trust the farmers of this county are fully alive to the importance of the coming agricultural Exhibition in September. This is a matter which directly interests every farmer in the county. Carleton will be on her trial, and pride in her resources and in their development, should inspire her citizens to put their best foot forward, and present to the thousands of strangers who will flock here to see and judge for themselves that Carleton is indeed the banner agricultural county of New Brunswick.

Strike on the C. P. R.

On Monday morning, as had been predicted, the section men on the C. P. R., went out on strike, but so far this movement has not interfered with the running of the trains. It is impossible to gain much information from either the railway officials or track men in regard to the matter; it is hoped and expected, however, that a satisfactory settlement of their difficulties may be effected in a few days; should the strike continue for any length of time, the engine drivers will consider it unsafe to drive their engines over a road that was not regularly inspected by competent section men.

Death of Mrs. Philip McCaffery.

One of the oldest residents of the town, Mrs. Philip McCaffery, passed away Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock, at the residence of John Thibedeau, where she had made her home for several years. The age of the deceased was 81 years and 4 months. Mrs. McCaffery was the relict of the late Philip McCaffery, in his day a magistrate and town councillor of Woodstock for many years. She was a woman of fine mental talents, generous to all deserving charities, and a neighbor whose friendship was sought and appreciated. The children—Mrs. Thibedeau, James and Thomas L. McCaffery—were present when the end came. On Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock a requiem mass was celebrated in St. Gertrude's church, by Rev. Father Chapman, and the interment took place in the old Roman Catholic cemetery, the following gentlemen acting as pall bearers: Peter Ryan, Edwin McClement, John McCormac and Daniel Sullivan.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF MUSIC.

Miss Elizabeth J. Walker, of New York, who arrived here on Wednesday of this week, will understand assist Mrs. Tappan Adney in the conduct of a "Summer School of Music." Miss Walker for a number of years was a pupil of Mrs. Adney (lately Miss Minnie B. Sharp) and has just concluded a course of instruction at New York under Dr. William Mason. Mrs. Adney will continue her vocal and piano pupils as previously announced, while Miss Walker will assist her in Piano, special attention being paid to beginners, for which, as well as advanced instruction, Miss Walker has had experience with Mrs. Adney in conducting the Victoria Conservatory of Music, an institution which was not only the foremost music school in the west of Canada, but has turned out a number of brilliant musicians, who are now continuing their study in other schools of the first grade both in this country and in Europe and with distinction, if we may judge by some criticisms of recent public performances. For instance, it is a pupil of Miss Walker who, according to the report we notice in the *Toronto Globe* of June 10th, describing the final exercises of Moulton College, Toronto, mentioned in particular Miss Agnes E. Dier. "Miss Dier," says the *Globe*, "played with much brilliancy of execution and confidence a variety of pieces from the works of Beethoven, Bach, Schumann, Mlynarski, Rubenstein and Mendelssohn, and was several times recalled, her playing of the Schumann Carnival scene being particularly fine." The report, of course, does not state, but Miss Dier had been a pupil of Miss Walker from the beginning until Miss Walker left Victoria and had but a few months' instruction at the Moulton College. The success of their former pupils should not only be highly satisfactory to their teachers, but also will serve as showing to those who are not familiar with the work done the past few years by Mrs. Adney and Miss Walker at far-off Victoria, the opportunity now opened here for those who wish musical instruction of the highest grade. We understand that special instruction will be given to music teachers from other parts of the Province who might care to thus spend their vacations this summer on this part of the St. John River.

Stocks generally for the season are on the heavy side, and shippers should act with caution by consigning moderately."

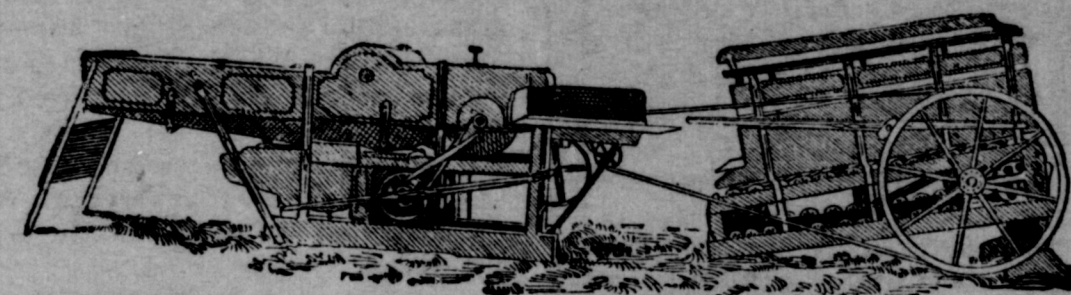
