#### A LOVING EXHORTATION.

(Copy of a letter sent out by Miss Kara G Smart, Y Secretary of South Dakota, to five hundred young women outside the ranks.)

My Dear—:

Although a stranger to you, I want to talk with you a few moments in regard to a great "inheritance" that has been left to you by one who was called "the best loved woman in America."

She it was who said, "The joy of life is doing good according to a plan." So well did she prove this true that you and I, who may come to know her through her writings, have fallen heir to possessions of untold value. The incentive of her life was, "What I ought to do, I will do," and she bent every energy to the doing of it. With this thought in mind she said, "Everything is not in the temperance reform, but the temperance reform is in everything."

Do you know, my dear girl, that 2,000 men a week, 300 a day, go down to an awful death through drink? And closely following them are their companions, 1,000 girls (your sisters and mine), who gave up their lives on the altar of impurity to satisfy the demands of the drink fiend?

Have you ever heard that crime in this country is increasing five times as fast as the population, and that 72 per cent. of it is due to drink, while 65 per cent. of the paupers and 51 per cent. of the insane come from the same source?

Do you wonder that, calling unto the womanhood of this land, Frances Willard said: "The mission of the white-ribbon women is to organize the motherhood and maidenhood of the world for the peace and purity, the protection and exaltation of its homes," and then set them at its accomplishment?

Do you wonder that many, many times she has appealed to us girls and young women, pleading, "Come, and join our band." And why have you not done so? Is it because you are unwilling to do something, even if it is only a mite, to lift this great burden of sin and misery and degradation from the hearts and lives of those less fortunate than yourself? I can not believe this. It must be because you did not know these things, did not know what others were suffering.

I hear yet another voice. It says, "Ye are the light of the world." "Ye are the salt of the earth." "It is the Master's! He is come and calleth for thee." He says, "the fields are white unto the harvest, but the laborers are few."

"Will you not answer, 'Callemth me? Then I will arise and go' to the aid of those so bravely struggling in this warfare against the drink dragon? Dear heart, if you only would answer thus, He would be so pleased. Over 10,000 girls in this land alone have heard the call and have joined our band. They would be glad, so glad, to welcome you as one of their number. Will you not come and at once?"

Before me lies a letter just received from a dear girl to whom this call came a few weeks ago. These are her words: "Something has occurred since I came home to make me ready to give my life, if it should be asked of me, for the temperance cause. I had not fully decided whether I wanted to enter that work or not. But now I am determined. Prepare my first lesson for me, ask me to do anything and everything that needs doing, and I will do it."

Dear friend, He has called you by joy, by the beautiful things He has sent into your life. Don't, I beg of you, delay responding to that call until He finds it necessary to call you through anguish and heartache. Then, dear one, "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it."

#### Paupers Made by Whiskey.

Mr. W. S. Caine declares that there are in the United Kingdom one million paupers. The United Kingdom, according to the recent census, has a population of 41,454,588. What a terrible record of poverty this is! But the causes of it are plain. Mr. Caine says:—

"I have been a politician for the last thirty years. It has been my business in life. I have had to approach a great many social questions of different kinds and I find that they are all complicated with the drink question, and that, if the drink problem should be settled once for all, it would dispose of a great many others with it. As a politician I have to approach the question of

pauperism. I find a million paupers in this country and a million so poor and so miserable that they are certain to take their places as the others die off. The numbers of paupers in London is, we are told, 101,000. It would take them sixteen hours to march four abreast along Holborn. It is a scandal to a Christian nation, the richest nation in the world, that we should have a million of people so miserable and poor that they have to depend upon the enforced contributions of the other sections of our community for their bare livelihood. When I come to examine the question of pauperism, I find that it has its source and spring in the drink traffic and the drinking customs of this country. I have been a guardian of the poor for two of the largest unions in the metropolis. I know what I am talking about. Nine tenths of the pauperism of this country is entirely, definitely due to drinking and drunkenness."

### The Ape-Like Man of Africa.

(From the London Telegraph.)

Sir Harry Johnston, who is home on leave from Uganda, is likely to add largely to our knowledge of that country as a result of the two years he has just completed there in the capacity of his Majesty's Special Commissioner. He brings with him photographs and measurements of the ape-like race of men whom Mr. Grogan and Mr. Sharp first encountered on the verge of the Congo forest. "I hope," said Sir Harry Johnston, "that the public interest in these matters will not form any exaggerated ideas on the subject until the material which I have gathered has been properly examined by anthropologists and my own impression as to the somewhat Simian character of these natives is confirmed. The ape-like people to whom I refer seem to constitute the underlying stratum of the population of the eastern outskirts of the great Congo forest, from the vicinity of Lake Albert down to the neighborhood of Lake Tanganyika, the western slopes of Mount Ruwenzori, and also, strange to say, on the west slope of Mount Elgon, the extinct volcano which lies about 150 miles east of the Victoria Nile. The general characteristics of these ape-like people, who sometimes constitute a tribe of pariahs by themselves, and sometimes crop up as a type in the middle of other tribes, have a dirty yellow skin, a poor development of the back of the head, eyes rather close together, with prominent eye-brows, low and much wrinkled foreheads. The hair is woolly, like that of the ordinary negro though it sometimes tends to be brownish in color. The arms are long and the thumbs weak. The legs are a little knock-kneed, and are often very short in proportion to the body. In one instance in which I took a photograph the toes are turned rather inward.

"Their stature as a rule is not much if any, below the average height of humanity. I can only say that in general appearance they do look as I have described them, very ape-like, but too much stress should not be laid on my general impression in this respect until the measurements which I have made of their heads and bodies are discussed by a competent authority on anthropometry.

"I have a kind of impression that this ape-like type of negro represents something like the original stock—the earliest form of negro man that entered the African continent from Asia."

### ENGLAND AND FRANCE.

One of the closest friends of the late president of France, M. Faure, has given to a Paris paper some memories of the late president and his fear of war with England about the time of the Fashoda incident. The late president then believed that France was about to enter upon a terrible war, not on account of Fashoda, but owing to the disturbed conditions which the Marchant expedition had created between France and England. M. Faure said that France would not have gone to war on account of Fashoda, as the intention of France had never been to occupy that place definitely. M. Faure added that the government which had not feared a war on account of the Fashoda incident itself, feared one on account of the war fever excited by the newspapers of both countries during the negotiations, a fever which would, he said, have rendered the very slightest incident impossible to arrange.

All the reports received by the secret service department of the government warned France to be prepared for war. The president said his country at the time was not prepared to fight England. The minister of war wanted coal, guns and troops, and coast defence, especially for Bizesta, which was at the mercy of a sudden attack. Money was wanted for these preparations, and the government had none. They could not ask the chamber for any without causing uneasiness in England. The ministers had the courage to incur the necessary expenses without authority. Everything was rapidly done that was necessary to resist a surprise. France emerged from this terrible crisis without war and certainly with increasing strength.

M. Faure said the president lived through days filled with anguish, and when the war clouds disappeared, said that he desired never to suffer the same suspense again.

The article has attracted considerable attention in England as it throws a vivid light upon many details of what was taking place when England and France were about springing at one another's throats. The article also shows how the French constitution was disregarded by the government, which devoted \$16,000,000 to national defence without consulting the chambers.

As France has rejected England's proposals with regard to Newfoundland, the world may soon again hear of the two countries talking of war.

### CARE OF THE SICK.

Never worry a sick person when he is doing anything, nor interrupt him when speaking. Never lean against, sit upon, or shake the bed upon which a sick person lies.

Never read to the sick, except when they ask it; then read what they crave, and do it slowly and distinctly. Give a little variety to the room by occasionally changing things. If flowers are craved, get them, but beware of the effect of very sweet perfumes.

Give little food at a time, but give it often, if craved. As a rule, invalids have slow appetites in the morning. You can sustain them until they get a desire for something substantial by giving them a little tea or light broth.

Never leave untasted food at the patient's bedside from meal to meal. Sight of what is not craved is repulsive.

Avoid filling a patient's plate. Have tempting quantities temptingly prepared and served. Cook with care.

As a rule, you can afford to give a patient a little of whatever is craved, unless the physician forbids. Sometimes the craving is morbid, then you can refuse to gratify it.

Ever watch the bedding. Keep the sheets clean and sweet. Do not load the patient with bedclothing.

### Curious Case of Hypnotism.

A curious case of hypnotism was before the courts in Rochester a few days ago, showing that hallucination can be imposed on a person by the will of a hypnotist and again dispelled by another operator. Martin Touhey took action against the city for injuries alleged to have been received by a fall on a dangerous sidewalk. The defence interposed on behalf of the corporation was that Touhey had been hypnotized into believing that he was injured, while he was not really hurt. The doctors who attended Touhey deposed that he believed himself seriously injured, and wore a steel corset to keep his ribs in place, which were supposed to have been displaced by the fall. A Buffalo physician was called in and succeeded in hypnotizing Touhey, assuring him that while under the influence that he was not injured. Touhey thereupon threw away his corset and went about as well as ever. The judges in appeal, by their decision, confirmed the plea that Touhey was under hypnotic influence when he brought the action, and only believed himself to have been injured when he really was not, and dismissed his suit. This case opens to the imagination a bewildering lot of possibilities concerning the legal responsibility of persons who allow themselves to be hypnotized.
