A PROHIBITION KING.

How an African king made a pro-
hibition law and enforced it in his
dominions is described by Dr. A. T.
Pierson in the *Missionary Review*.
It appears that Sekhome, the chief
of the Bamangwato, the father of
Khama, had no faith in Christianity,
and when Khama became a Chris-
tian, Sekhome tried to prevent his
succeeding him. After some trouble
however, Khama did succeed and
set about governing according to his
Christian principles.

He began to fight rum systemati-
cally. He called the white men to-
gether and told them his mind. They
pleaded to be allowed to bring in
small cases of brandy as medicine.
He gave consent, but he must see no
drunkenness. Of course the drunk-
enness came. Then there was a new
summons for the white men, and this
time they were forbidden even to
bring in drink for their private table
use. "Bring none! I will allow none!
There's an end of it!" He had to re-
sort to fines, threats and even ban-
ishment from the country; but he
stood firm. When, after many pro-
vocations, the crisis came, and not-
withstanding oft-repeated warnings,
there was drunken violence and up-
roar, the good Khama wore a stern
face, which always meant fixed pur-
pose. He went and saw with his own
eyes how his laws were trampled on,
and then he said:—

"You despise my laws because I
am a black man. Well, if I am black
I am chief of my own country, and I
rule here and shall maintain my
laws. Go back to your own country.
Take all that is yours, and go. If
there is any other white man who
does not like my laws, let him go,
too. I am trying to lead my people
to act according to the Word of God,
which we have received from you
white people, and you, white people,
show them an example of wicked-
ness such as we never knew. You
know that some of my brothers have
learned to like the drink, and that I
do not want them even to see it, that
they may forget the habit; and yet
you not only bring it and offer it to
them, but try to tempt me with it.
I make an town of it to-day. Go,
leave my town, and never come
back."

The effect of such talk from an
African chief was like a thunderclap
—everybody was stunned. One man
at last ventured to plead for exemp-
tion from the stern law of banish-
ment on the ground that he had
grown up in the country, and he and
Khama were old friends. "Surely,
for old friendship's sake you will
pity me!"

"Friendship!" said the indignant
Khama, "you call yourself my friend,
do you? You are the ring leader
among those who insult and despise
my laws." Then, with withering
words of rebuke, he answered his
plea for pity, by reminding him that
there was a "pity" which he owed
to his own people. His answer was
worthy of Chief Justice Hale, who
had used similar words, of the
"mercy" due to his own country and
which he would endanger if he was
unjustly merciful to criminals. Khama
flamed with righteous anger, but he
cleaned his town that day of the
white man's drink-curse; and then
he also forbade the use and sale and
manufacture of native beer. At one
time death seemed to threaten him
if he carried on his holy crusade;
but he only answered, "You may
kill, but you cannot conquer me."

No Cigarette Smokers Need Apply.

The Sante Fe has issued an order
that no one addicted to the use of
cigarettes shall be given employ-
ment by that company, and a num-
ber of cigarette smokers working for
the company have been dismissed.

The crusade against cigarettes has
not yet formally reached the Indian-
apolis roads, but is being quietly en-
forced on some of them. At present
the rule against cigarettes is applied
principally in the general depart-
ments and a number of clerks who
have been let out in order "to re-
duce expenses" are not aware that
they were dismissed because they
smoked cigarettes, and many appli-
cants failed to get positions for the
same reason.

Every applicant has to pass a writ-
ten examination and, in addition to
that, his personal habits are investi-
gated. An occasional drink is gen-
erally overlooked, but if it is found
that he is in the habit of smoking
cigarettes there is no chance for
him. The rule against cigarettes on
some of the local roads is applied
also to applicants for positions in the
train service, though there is noth-
ing in the blank application that an-
nounces the fact. Most of the offi-
cers, however, are determined that
the employees shall not be cigarette
fiends, and it is understood that by
the first of the year the roads will
issue formal orders on the subject.—
Indianapolis News.

Chicago, Dec 2.—A Hereford is the
grand champion of all breeds in the
fat cattle division of the internation-
al live stock exposition this year.
Chief interest for breeders centred
to-day in the grand championship
of the show for steer or spayed heif-
er. There were three competing
breeds, Herefords, Short Horns and
Angus, but in the final judging the
Short Horns were eliminated. The
winning animal is Woods' Principal,
a pure bred yearling shown by Geo
P Henry of Goodnow, Ills. This ani-
mal weighed 1645 pounds. The Aber-
deen, Angus representatives, were
Empress Damask, calved in April,
1899, weighing 1450 pounds, being
the property of Collin Dysart of
Nashua, Ills, and the yearling
steer Tip Top, weighing 925 pounds,
the property of S Bradute & Son of
Cedarville, Ohio. In the contest in
the first class for Hereford bulls,
three-year-olds or over, Mark Hanna
shown by N D Smith of Compton,
Que, won third place. In the horse
department the following first prizes
were awarded among others:—

under four—Stallion shown by Gra-
ham Bros, Claremont, Ont.
Clydesdale stallion, 2 years old and
under three—Prince Punctual, shown
by Graham Bros.

A SHOCKING RECORD.

A leading American clergyman, on
Sunday week, startled his congrega-
tion by reading some homicide sta-
tistics. He told his congregation
that "home life is safer in the domi-
nions of the Ameer of Afghanistan
than it is in Kentucky. There are
more murders in Louisville with 200,
000 people than there is in London
with 1,000,000. There are more mur-
ders in Kentucky with its 2,000,000
people than in Great Britain with a
population of 40,000,000. Finally,
there are more murders in the Uni-
ted States than in the whole of Eu-
rope, with Italy and Turkey left out
and Russia included."

Commenting on the same, a lead-
ing Boston paper says that "this
statement is true. No other civil-
ized nation approaches this in the
matter of murder, and those which
comes nearest to it are such
countries as Italy and Turkey where
the assassin's knife is freely used and
where men allow their anger and
hate and disgraceful passions to rule
their conduct. This nation has a re-
cord of which it should be heartily
ashamed."

The *Washington Post* adds that
"it is not our purpose to discharge
foreign missions, for they are doing
a vast deal of good in many
countries; but we sometimes think
it requires a strong equipment of
"nerve" for Americans to go abroad
to spread righteousness leaving so
horrible a 'red record' in their own
country."
