Fining is not Much Good.

We very seriously doubt, and our doubt is the result of close observation, if anything is gained, (other than a few dollars) for the suppression of the liquor traffic by fining, or even jailing, those engaged in the traffic.

Fine the dealer, and in nine cases out of ten he pays the fine, and then goes on selling to every Tom, Dick and Harry in order to reimburse himself, with something to the good. Put him in jail, and he leaves some person in charge to sell for him, so that when he comes out of durance vile he is actually better off than when he went in. Not a drop less of liquor has been sold, and men who should not have liquor, have obtained it as usual. The facts are before our eyes, and we may as well notice them. We believe the only and most effectual way of suppressing the illegal sale of liquor is to seize the illegal goods, and keep on seizing them. When a man does not have the liquor he cannot sell it, and he won't buy if he knows it is going to be taken from him.—*Searchlight.*

The Training of Boys.

Complaints are common, says the London Express, of the lack of manners in the young men of to-day. In most instances this may be traced to want of training in early youth. Boys who are rude to servants, and hector and domineer in the nursery, are not likely to develop a courteous way to women when they are older. They are very easily influenced; their hearts are soft, and a little "mother's talk" at night will produce great results. You cannot begin too soon if you wish to make your son a gentleman in the best sense of the word.

From babyhood teach him to give in to his sisters, because they are girls and need consideration. If he pulls their hair or kicks them—for alas! small boys are often bullies—never pass over such an offence. Do not allow any rudeness or disrespect. Demand courteous treatment; make him bring you a chair, open the door when you leave the room, walk on the outer side of the pavement, and, in fact, behave to you as he ought to other women in the future. It means a little trouble and reminding him at first, but in time the little ways will become habits instinctively performed.

CANADA'S BRITISH MAIL.

A rough estimate of the weight of the letters and postcards despatched from Great Britain to Canada during 1900 reaches 83,500 pounds, while the weight of the circulars, books and newspapers was 1,068,000 pounds. From Canada 70,000 pounds of letters and 375,000 pounds of circulars, books and newspapers reached this country. The number of parcels despatched during the year ending March 1901, was 95,387.
