## ALCOHOL AND TUBERCULOSIS.

It has been the fashion in high medical circles to treat the subject of total abstinence either with contempt or as matter for joking. We remember a certain meeting not many years ago where some of the big-wigs of the profession ridiculed total abstinence, perhaps for want of a better argument. Such treatment is not unknown even at the present day. It is, therefore, with some sense of satisfaction that we find the statements and warnings of temperance men suddenly confirmed and reinforced in the most open and telling fashion by a medical professor who cannot be disposed of in quite the same fashion. We refer to the important pronouncement of Prof. Brouardel, at the recent congress on tuberculosis. He did not mince matters, and we can well understand the blankness of some faces on hearing or reading words which re-echo the warnings of hundreds of temperance reformers. The words are so apposite that we reproduce them in full.

"Unhealthy dwellings cause other disasters. Dark and crowded as they are, cleanliness is difficult, if not impossible, to preserve; they are not pleasant to pass the time in, and the workman stays in his home as little as possible; he eats there and sleeps there, but the rest of his time is spent in the public-house. J. Simon was right in saying: 'The wretched lodging is the purveyor of the public-house,' and we can add to it that the public-house is the purveyor of tuberculosis. In fact, alcoholism is the most potent factor in propagating tuberculosis. The strongest man, who has once taken to drink, is powerless against it. Time is too short for me now to draw comparisons between the laws in force in different countries, those which are proposed, private efforts, associated efforts, and temperance societies. But I can say that a universal cry of despair rises from the whole universe at the sight of the disasters caused by alcoholism."

We have said that there is nothing new in the view that alcohol is a great cause of tuberculosis. Another French doctor, Dr. Thiron, at the Paris Congress, stated that alcohol predisposed of tuberculosis and did not cure it. Prof. Charcot and Bouchar (Traite de Medicin, vol. ii, "Alcoholism") wrote that alcohol favors pulmonary tuberculosis, making a fitting soil for receiving and fructifying the bacillus of Koch. On the biology of the tubercle bacillus they say: "It thrives in nutritive media containing starchy and sugary matter, which it partially transforms into alcohol. This microbe not only does not die in this medium nor in the matters formed by it, but if they filled an old culture and sow it again it develops as well as in a new medium. This is different from what occurs with most microbes. It follows that the tubercle bacillus is very resistant, that it is nourished by alcohol (in vitro) and hence there is the strongest reason to suppose that it remains active in the body of the alcoholized individual and thrives there." In view of all these facts we may reasonably ask all those who are in earnest in radiating tuberculosis to begin by eradicating alcohol, and as in the practice of Charity, to begin at home.—Medical Temperance Review.

## Law and the Liquor Traffic.

Louis O. Lehman, writing in Christian Standard, says: The liquor traffic is criminal—not only the associate of crime, or the source of crime, but the very essence of crime. Its every manifestation militates against the highest ideals of "life, light, liberty, law and love." Life it destroys, light it hates, liberty it degrades to license, law it disregards, and love it cannot know. And yet, cursed of God and man, it lives! Lives, yea, prospers and rules! Having purchased with a paltry bit of metal a legal right to existence, it subsidizes the press, intimidates the politicians, dominates the political party, controls the elections, disregards the laws, outrages all decency and defies interference.

At Logan Courthouse, W. Va., every saloon is closed and the proprietor of each is in jail. One has \$3,200 in fines assessed against him. The saloonmen organized and refused to pay the fines, with the result that all places of business were closed on May 2 and every saloon-keeper in town locked up.

## The Hippopotamus.

Next to the elephant the hugest beast in point of bulk and weight is the hippopotamus. Of this animal Sir Samuel Baker has seen hundreds of specimens on the White Nile. One that he measured was 14 feet 3 inches long from snout to tip of tail. The crocodile never ventures to attack the hippopotamus, which for its part disdains to attack the crocodile. Although, like the rhinoceros, this monarch of mid-African rivers is not carnivorous, it is very formidable to man, being easily provoked and assailing the object of its resentment with reckless fury. It can upset the largest boat, and in one instance perforated with its tusks the iron bottom of Sir Samuel's steamer, causing a dangerous leak. The flesh of the hippopotamus is always palatable, and when the animal is young it is delicious. The skin makes excellent turtle soup. The tusks were formerly more valuable than those of the elephant, being in request by dentists because they never turn yellow.

## WASTED WORDS.

In typewriting five hundred letters, says London *Tid-Bits*, you waste one hour in writing "Dear Sir" and "Yours very truly." Now, the total annual number of letters sent through the post office all over the world is 8,000,000,000. Of course this is not all commercial correspondence, nor is it all typewritten, but for the purpose of having some statistical starting point it will be assumed that it is. To write "Dear Sir" and "Yours very truly" for this number of letters would take one typist 16,000,000 hours, allowing 300 working days to the year, about 6,700 years. To translate this into an approximation of its money value, allowing £2 as the salary of the typist, and eight hours as the average day's work, the cost would be £670,000.

Curative Properties of the Madstone.

The madstone is supposed to be taken from the stomach of a white deer. It is about the size of an English walnut, and slightly porous. When a person is bitten by an animal afflicted with rabies, the stone is placed on the bite. It immediately sticks, sometimes for half an hour.

One of the greatest fears of the cowpuncher is of being bitten by a skunk. In the cattle country, when the puncher is on the range and must sleep outdoors at night, he hardly ever lies down on the ground without thinking of this danger. When he is bitten it is almost always in the face. Nine times out of ten hydrophobia symptoms develop. In most cases he is anywhere from 20 to 50 miles from a doctor, and search is made among the ranchers for a madstone. The cowpuncher is simple in his faiths, and he clings to this one. The value of a madstone varies with its owner. The stone just told of was held at \$500.

## DUSTY SUNBEAMS.

Have you ever noticed what a lot of dust seems to get into the track of a sunbeam shining through the window of a room? Some people may think that there is as much dust floating elsewhere in the air of the room as in this sunbeam. This, however, is not the case. There are actually far more motes in a sunbeam than in the darker air around it. This is because the sun's rays cause the air to contract and expand irregularly, thus creating currents in the atmosphere, which rouse up the dust, and collect it all together. These currents are the cause of the constant swirling and spinning about of the dust specks which everyone has noticed who has watched them in a beam of light. At the Woodwardian Museum, Cambridge, Eng., this was proved in an interesting way. The glass cases there got much dustier on the sides exposed to the sunshine than on the sides which were not. It cost three times as much to keep the specimens clean in the sunny parts as in the shaded parts.
