#### Ontario Rum Traffic

The report of the License department of the Ontario Government, just out, shows that the number of liquor licenses issued last year was 3,000, being 31 less than the previous year. The revenue from licenses and fines was \$304,819, being an increase of \$43,296 over the preceding year. These figures show that there has been no dimunition of the traffic. Lessening the number of licenses does not lessen the volume of the traffic, it merely increases the value of the monopoly of the licenses. The people pay more than they did before, and have the inevitable increase of curses in addition. And yet they call it business!

Then pinning on her white bow she went out to get up the nicest dinner she knew how. At the call-bell the family entered the dining room. Both husband and wife took instant notice of the bow and evidently sized up the situation. The husband glanced over at the box of liquors, lying just where the express man had dropped it; there was a whispsred conference and, after the meal, the box disappeared and was heard of no more.

#### A Vigilance Committee.

The increase of crime in New York city is so manifest that some good citizens have become alarmed. A Vigilance Committee has been appointed, consisting of fifteen wellknown men of high standing. The committee is to institute inquiries into the cause of the increase of erime, to trace the connection of crime with political organizations, to furnish facts, to promote such legistation as will aid in stamping out crime, and put the responsibility for the execution of laws upon persons who can be called to account.

The members or employes of the committee will give as much time to the good government of the city as the politicians of Tammany give to looting or to selling privileges to violate the laws without arrest. The committee will have plenty of funds contributed by friends of good order. Several of them are men of wealth. They will devote their attention first

#### Agricultural.

Table Poultry for England.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture gives the following information relating to the breeds of poultry whose chickens fatten most profitably. We are pleased to note the advancement of chicken fattening in Canada, and would advise all farmers intending to fatten their chickens, to raise the suitable breeds recommended by Prof. Robertson.

Since the preferences in every market determine what sort of goods is most readily sold on that market, in catering for the high-class poultry trade of England, the qualities sought for in the best table poultry must be carefully considered. These qualities are :- plumpness of breast, whiteness of skin, fineness of grain, smallness of bone and absence of offal.

Breeding stock, whose chickens fatten profitably and are suitable for the best English markets, consists of fowls of a square shape, with long, broad breast, and straight keel. The wings of large size, and the combs as small as possible. The birds must be active, healthy and vigorous; the chickens should be hardy, mature early and fatten readily. Heavyboned and heavy-legged poultry must be avoided.

With regard to the breed of fowl to be made use of, the barred Plymouth Rock has fattened very satisfactorily at the Dominion government poultry fattening stations. At the Bondville, Que., station, Mr. Hillhouse fatted a number of barred Rock cockerels that when dressed and ready to pack into the cases, weighed eight pounds each. Some of these chickens were exhibited at the fat stock show in Guelph, Ont., last December, and were greatly admired. Whilst they all had bright one of the several thousand chickens shipped to England last year from the poultry fattening stations had a yellow-colored skin. Legs must not be dark or black in color. All other qualities being equal, a yellow-legged chicken brings the same price in England as one having white legs.

In breeding rocks for table quality, select a male bird with short legs, and with a small low comb. The English poultryman, remember, buys the head and legs of the chicken, and pays less per pound for chickens with long, heavy legs and large combs. Do not develop these useless qualities.

White Wyandottes fatted well at the Whitby, Ont., fattening station. They are superior to the barred rocks in that they have less offal, i. e., smaller combs and lighter bone; they do not however, fatten to as heavy birds. The chickens mature quickly, and are plump broilers at almost any age.

Throughout Canada, chicken fattening is developing into an important branch of agriculture. The above breeds of poultry, barred Rocks and white Wyandottes, are recommended for fattening purposes by the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

To show that they suit the high class English market, I quote the following letter from the agent of the Department of Agriculture in London, England.

"Chickens were in good condition; the cases marked "A" (Whitby) particularly good, as bright and sweet as possible and in splendid condition. The dealers that handled these goods said that they were as fine chickens as they ever handled, and would only let their customers have one or two cases at a time, as they would sell for best prices to parties that demanded the very best class of goods. They were prepared and packed in the best manner; cases the right size. These chickens compare favorably with the best Fnglish fowls."

Poultry Pointers.

Use no deformed or weak fowls for breeding.

Young chicks will eat wheat when

two weeks old. Keep the pens and houses clean

and the fowls from vermin. Apoplexy and egg bound are the results of excessive fat,

When eggs are the chief object, the nonsitting breeds are best. Reduce the winter stock of poultry

as much as possible to layers. Eggs pay well in winter. In most cases the best thing you

kill and burn it. While it may be cured, there is always the risk that it may give the disease to others of the flock.

With poultry, as with other stock there never was a time when careful selection failed to give good results, especially when extra attention is given to the selection of the male used for breeding.

Oats are a very useful food to give to poultry, as they stimulate without enervating or fattening. They form a good diet to reduce the fat of hens that are too fat to lay, while if ground and fed with boiled potatoes they make an excellent food for produce See. Treas. ing fertile eggs.
