## THE MEDICAL VIEW.

During the recent meeting of the British Medical Association, a "temperance breakfast" was held at Cheltenham, England. One of the speakers on that occasion was Mr. McAdam Eccles, F. R. C. S., the well known surgeon. He gave a description, in popular language, of the effects of alcohol upon the human body.

Taken in the ordinary way, its first effect was that of warmth, which was due to the stimulation of the cells of the mucous membranes, which cells were to a very large extent the nerve endings of a multitude of nerve fibres which ran over the whole body. The next effect was that of paralysing the cells, so as to render them powerless to perform their proper functions. The third effect was to kill the cell, and the last effect was to preserve the dead cell and prevent its decomposition. The first effect was exactly similar to that seen in the whipping of a horse the cells tried to run away from the alcohol just as the animal did from the lash. The second effect upon the cells in the stomach was to produce dyspepsia. The unfortunate thing was that every time the cell was paralysed by alcohol it never completely recovered itself, and this was particularly so in connection with the cells of the nervous system and of the brain. Professor Victor Horsley had shown that quite a small dose of alcohol carried to the brain had an effect on the cells of the brain which was never completely got rid of and personally, he (the speaker) was of the opinion that many more deaths arose through taking alcohol than was commonly supposed. By paralysing the cell centres, alcohol robbed a man of the control of certain of his lower faculties, and that was the explanation of the glib tongue and the muscular action of the drunkard. If alcohol did all this, he had no hesitation in saying its use was deleterious to health. As to use in case of disease, he not being a physician, would offer no opinion; but as a surgeon he emphatically declared that it was useless in surgical cases. For some forms of scientific investigation it was, no doubt, of value, but not for administration to patients.

## LIQUOR IS EVIL.

Liquor is evil because it defiles and destroys the image of God in man. The glory of God's image is integrity and purity. Liquor pollutes the temple of God, throws down the sovereignty of a holy will, and opens the life to lust and excess. If it be said that it does not always do this, but only when intemperately used, it may be replied that that is just what liquor makes it difficult not to do. If safety in its use is to be found only in temperance, then the only sure way to be temperate is to refuse to use it at all. Thousands of men have started out to use liquor moderately who have ended by using it immoderately. And when once its immoderate use has begun, what a hell is let loose—the unsightly disintegration of a human life slowly eaten out with the poison of drink, a home ruined and tarnished with shame, loved ones linked to the poor wretched career that is going down to the level of the beasts. The only sure way to escape this end is to avoid the beginning. Not every drinker ends thus, but the only safe way for any man to escape such an end is to refrain absolutely from drink.

And abstinence is not only best for the man's self, but necessary, if he will be innocent of other men's sins. "It is good," said Paul, "not to drink wine nor to do anything whereby thy brother stumbleth." I cannot act as though this were my world, and I were the only man in it. Even so, it would be better not to touch liquor. But every man's conduct affects the conduct of scores of other men. Suppose you are strong enough to resist the temptation to excess, what right have you to start another man on that course who is not strong enough? His blood will God require at your hand.—Sunday School Times.

## No Chance in History.

Mazzini said that he did not believe that chance existed in history. When he came the life had already gone out of it, and even Caesar's death could not restore that."

AS WASPS WORK.

One of the great industries which has risen in comparatively recent years is that of making paper from wood. A log of wood is floated down the river to a pulp mill and, in a surprisingly short time, comes out in a great sheet of pulp, ready to be sent on to the paper mill. ## THE KING'S CORONATION.

New York, Dec. 11.—The London correspondent of the *Tribune* says: The royal proclamation announcing the date of the King's coronation is an interesting document, not only because of its novelty but also because of its curious phraseology. Having announced the date of the coronation, June 26, the proclamation goes on to say: "We do hereby strictly charge and command all our loving subjects, whom it may concern, that all persons of what rank or quality so ever they be, who, either on our letters to them directed, or by reason of their office and tenures or otherwise, are to do any service at the time of our coronation do duly give their attendance at said solemnity in all respects furnished and appointed as to so great a solemnity appertaineth and answerable to the dignities and places which every one of them respectively holdeth and enjoyeth, and of this they or any of them are not to fail as they will answer contrary at their perils."

King Edward's coronation festivities will include a gigantic naval demonstration. Each power will be asked to send a ship flying an admiral's flag. It is almost taken for granted that Rear-Admiral Sampson, of the United States navy, and the Duke of Genoa, of the Italian navy, will be present and fly their flags.
