WHY MEN DON'T MARRY.

The Rev. L. M. Isitt, speaking at York, Eng., said the matters of courtship and marriage were of too solemn and holy a character to be lightly commented on, but why was it that there were so many young men who were described as the unmarried order? It was said that the young men could not afford to get married. Why? Living was cheaper than it used to be, and men now earned more than their fathers received. The answer was that the liquor traffic had got such a hold on the young men of the age, who, though it might be never drunk to excess, still wasted day by day and week by week such considerable sums that they never would be able to get married.

ANARCHY AND THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

A huge audience was addressed on a recent Sunday by the Rev. Dr. Silas C. Swallow in the auditorium of the Harrisburg (Pa.) Board of Trade. In the course of his address, which was a powerful arraignment of the liquor traffic, Dr. Swallow said:

The greatest anarchist of the centuries is the legalized liquor traffic, and our government has formed a "covenant" with it, an "agreement" with it. God's law says: "Look not upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth its color to the cup, when it moveth itself aright," that is, fermented, "for at last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." God says: "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." God classes drunkards with thieves, and says they "shall not inherit the kingdom of God." God says: "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that putteth thy bottle to him and maketh him drunk also."

Yes, we unto you, distiller, brewer, hop and barley grower, bar and saloon owner or tender; we unto you bondsmen, license signer, judge who grants the license, lawyer who advocates it, legislator who authorizes it, governor who endorses it, and, last but not least, you, voter, who standing behind them all cast a ballot on election day that renders them your agents in the work of drunkard making.

A PROHIBITION AUDITORIUM.

A magnificent new auditorium, seating 1,500 persons, the gift of Staunton, Va., and to moral reform of James W. Bodley, the widely known philanthropist and Prohibitionist of that city, was dedicated recently by immense Prohibition rallies. Mr. Bodley is a most generous supporter of the Prohibition cause. In declaring his purpose in the erection of the auditorium, Mr. Bodley said:

I was once a party man, steadily adhering to one of the old parties, but the time came when I could no longer conscientiously support it, and for eight years I did not vote and for nine years did not hear a political speech. I then determined to join the Prohibition party as that of truth and right, and for twenty-five years I have had no occasion to regret it. I had been called a crank, but I learned in early boyhood that one of the most necessary appliances for the proper running of an engine was a crank. Years ago I intended to build an auditorium in this city, but residence in another state and other causes have prevented up to this time. I have now erected a building in which a non-sectarian Sunday school can be conducted, and which will be used for the cause of religion, temperance and morality.

INDIANAPOLIS' SPLENDID GAIN.

The official returns of the municipal election in Indianapolis give James B. Dungan, Prohibition candidate for mayor, 1,356 votes, ninety per cent gain over the Woolley vote. This is the high water mark for Prohibitionists in the Hoosier State capital. The campaign was conducted with a vim and vitality that astounded old-party politicians and despite an apathy on the part of the great mass of the people that neither the Republicans nor the Democrats were able to dispel. A complete city organization, with ward and precinct chairmen alive to every opportunity of the campaign was a prominent factor in the fine showing made. The Prohibitionists are already planning a twelve months' state campaign for the state election of 1902. Every worker in the party is heartily encouraged over the results of the municipal contest and the efficient campaign that achieved them.

The Maritime Winter Fair.

It is proposed to make the Fat Stock Show, to be held at Amherst on the 17th, 18th and 19th of December next, one of the best educational efforts ever attempted on agricultural lines. The prizes aggregate \$1,918, divided as follows: For fat cattle in the Shorthorn class \$462.00; other breeds of cattle, \$352; Grade cattle, \$417; Pure Bred sheep, \$240; Grade sheep, \$120; sheep carcasses, \$24; Swine, \$120; Swine carcasses, \$28; dressed poultry, \$85. A considerable number of cattle, sheep and swine are being fitted for this competition and will insure a fine display. Among the cattle will be the sweepstakes steer from the Pan-American Exhibition. In addition to this splendid show of fat stock there will be a lecture program upon the same lines as that carried out at the Ontario Winter Fair at Guelph, an exhibition which is acknowledged to be the best educational institution on live stock matters in the world. Several of the judges and lecturers will come direct from the Guelph Show to Amherst.

Day of Judgment Close at Hand.

A Danbury, Conn., despatch states that the hour of judgment is close at hand according to a statement issued by Dr. Annie K. Bailey of that city, one of the best known women physicians in Connecticut.

Beginning on Dec. 9th and continuing until Dec. 26th, she declares the sun and all the planets will be in a direct line, and the earth will be alone on one side of the sun and all the planets on the other side, as they were in the days of Noah and the flood.

Dr. Bailey says, that from the time that God said of the sun, moon and stars, "Let them be signs," remarkable astronomical phenomena have attended all the great events to which it refers. Christ said, "As it was in the days of Noah, so shall it be in the days of the son and man."

Aroostook Potato Yield.

Bangor, Nov. 18.—It is estimated by authorities that the Aroostook potato yield this year will reach figures at least thirty and perhaps fifty per cent larger than those of last year. On account of the high prices prevailing the early part of the season, when potatoes touched \$2.25 per barrel at Houlton, the starch factories did not consume so large a part of the crop as usual and the shipments of that article will probably show a slight falling off during the next few months. The entire crop this year, including potatoes for export, the starch factories and home consumption, is estimated to be between 10,000,000 and 15,000,000 bushels. The price asked of \$1.65 per barrel, which is the present figure, is a great advance over the price at this season last year, when potatoes brought only from \$1.20 to \$1.30. Up to date the railroad has carried nearly 500,000 more bushels than in the same time in 1900.
