Victoria's Seven Precedents.

On seven occasions Queen Victoria was subjected to assaults, some of them with evident intent to kill. The British law made every one of these assaults high treason punishable with death. But in every case, agreeably to the Queen's desire, her assailants were declared insane and sent to asylums for life. Some of them are believed to be still wearing their lives out in the madhouses, though the Queen has meantime died a natural death. As one result of this method of dealing with her would-be assassins Victoria has passed into history as a monarch against whom no man in his right mind ever raised his hand.

VESSELS OVERLAND.

A NOVEL RAILWAY PROJECT TALKED OF IN NOVA SCOTIA.

There is at least one walk of life in which Canadians can claim a high position, and that is the engineering profession. Canadian engineers have long been favorably known for their skill and enterprise, and many a signal triumph have they attained in the way of railroad and bridge building. But an enterprise now on foot in the Province of Nova Scotia, will, if carried out, put the engineering to a severe test.

This undertaking is a marine railway designed to carry ships across the narrow isthmus that separates the Bay of Fundy from Northumberland strait, an arm of the gulf of St Lawrence. The project was first talked of in the eighties, but was abandoned about ten years ago, because the necessary amount of capital was not forthcoming. Now, however, it is on a fair road to success, for the British investors in the proposed railroad have taken the matter up again and are determined to recoup themselves for the losses they sustained before.

To this end they have sent to this country Mr A D Provand, formerly a member of Parliament for the Blackfriars division of Glasgow, and one of the leading directors in the original corporation. Mr Provand is hard at work at Halifax arousing interest in the railway and is meeting with much success. Speaking in Halifax to a friend the other day, he said:

"It is a scheme which should appeal to every shipowner along the Bay of Fundy and to all foreign owners who have dealings in this part of the world. The railway is intended to carry all sorts and conditions of vessels overland from the Bay of Fundy waters to the strait, and vice versa, a distance of only 20 miles and a saving of a run of several hundred miles around the Nova Scotia peninsula and Cape Breton island."

"Not only will a great gain be made in the matter of time, but vessels which now beset them on this rocky coast, where, as is well known, storms seem to rage more violently than at other Atlantic points. They will escape, too, the dangerous fogs, currents and icebergs, so prevalent in the channel between Newfoundland and Cape Breton. Altogether shipowners should be quick to recognize the benefits to be obtained by them from our railway."

As will be seen by a glance at the map, the railway if it becomes a reality will surely prove a boon to shipping. It will certainly present a very odd appearance, for it will have to be built in such a way that over its tracks may be conveyed vessels from small fishing schooners to large ocean liners. Despite all the difficulties that have to be encountered its promoters believe it can be successfully operated.

Material evidences of the Chignecto Marine Railroad, as it will be called, are even now in existence, for work was begun on it years ago when the old company was formed. The Government promised a large sum to subsidize the project, and the promoters spent nearly \$4,000,000, but in 1890 a financial depression in England prevented the company from obtaining further capital. As the Government subsidy was contingent upon the completion of the work in a certain time, that money, too, was lost to the promoters.

Mr Provand is now endeavoring to secure financial aid from the Government. He contends that the British public was induced to invest millions of dollars toward the undertaking on the strength of promises held out to them by Canada. Whatever the result of his efforts, it is certain that he has managed to arouse a great deal of enthusiasm in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Sentenced to Shun Liquor.

Of all the unique sentences by a court of justice, the one credited to Judge Paul Sveistrup, in Samsoe, Denmark, will probably long stand alone. 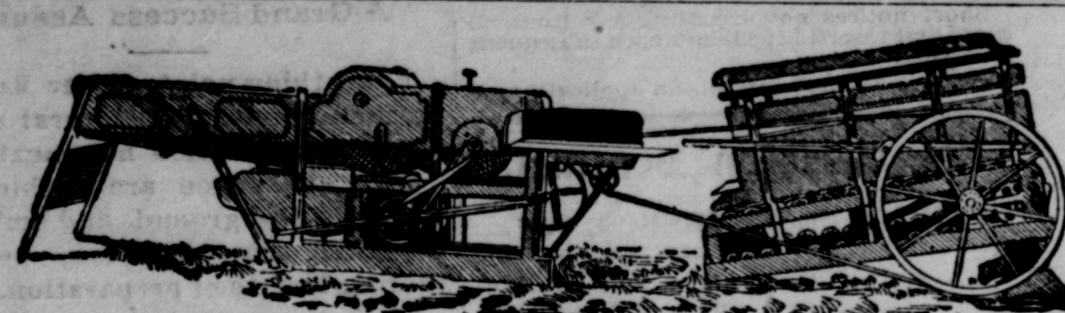
