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THE SENTINEL regrets to learn of the serious illness of Senator Geo. T. Baird, of Andover, Victoria County.

JUSTICE King, of the Supreme Court, whose illness we announced last week, died at his residence, Ottawa, on Tuesday night. His illness had been of long duration. Justice King had filled many important public positions, in all of which he displayed good judgment and ability of a high order. During the time he occupied a seat in the local legislature, he was the introducer, or supporter, of some of the most important acts ever passed by the Assembly, notably, the Free School Act, Abolition of Imprisonment for Debt, General Assessment Act, the Municipality Act of 1877, etc. He was, comparatively a young man, 62 years of age, and his death will command the universal regret of the people of Canada.

THE Fredericton Herald says:—There are now two vacancies in the Senate created by the death of Senator Almon of Halifax and Senator Ross of Quebec, both Conservatives. The Conservative majority, after the vacancies have been filled, will be reduced to nine, and three of these are found frequently supporting the government. If the Liberals would attend, they have now a sufficient number to outvote their opponents, because there are a number of Conservatives, who, on account of failing health, cannot attend. The voting in the senate showed that, when the Liberals reached 35, they would virtually control the upper chamber. Things are coming our way.

Father Carney Promoted.

Rev. F. L. Carney, M. A., who for many years has faithfully and successfully discharged the duties of Priest, in the parish of Richmond, has been elevated to the pastorate of St. Dunstan's Church, Fredericton, as successor to Right Rev. D. Casey. Father Carney is a graduate of Memramcook College and St. Surplice Seminary, Quebec at both of which institutions he greatly distinguished himself. He is a native of St. John and during his pastorate at Debec has been the means of the erection of three neat churches.

Father Carney is of a kindly disposed, liberal and social make up and has endeared himself to the members of his own flock, and gained the respect and esteem of all classes. While his parishioners regret to lose him, they rejoice at his elevation.

Presented With A Watch.

It was a little slow in arriving, but Harry McLean was presented with his watch, on Monday evening. It will be remembered that Mr. McLean was sick in the hospital in South Africa and consequently was unable to accompany the Carleton County contingent to their homes. Shortly after their arrival each of the members was presented with a watch by their admiring citizens. When Mr. McLean arrived, the money had been expended, but Mayor Belyea and Coun Balmann were appointed by the Council to procure a watch.

Mayor Belyea, in addressing Mr. McLean, said he was happy to present him with the watch, which he had so loyally earned by his service at the front. When the call for volunteers came he was among the first to offer his services to the Queen and his Country. He had been willing to risk his life for the cause. When the names of the members of this Council were forgotten, his name would be remembered by coming generations. His Worship trusted he would receive the watch not for its intrinsic value, but because it represented the commendation of his fellow citizens; he should treasure the watch and wear it as long as life would last.

Mr. McLean said he appreciated the words of the mayor, speaking for the citizens, and would value the watch very highly. He would have liked to have been with the boys for the reception home, but sickness would not allow it. He appreciated the gift as well now, as he would have had he received it at the larger gathering. He heartily thanked the Mayor and Council for their token of good will, and would always carry the watch as a souvenir, to remind him of his South African campaign.

RECENT DEATHS.

MRS. JAMES McLEAN.
Mrs. Catherine McLean, wife of James McLean, accompanied by Dr. Hand, went to Fredericton the first of last week to enter Victoria Hospital, to have an operation performed for tumor and stomach trouble. The operation was performed on Wednesday, but she did not survive, dying Friday morning. The remains arrived in Woodstock Saturday and the funeral took place Sunday afternoon; the large attendance showed the high regard in which deceased was held by the community. Rev. J. W. Clark officiated at the interment.

WILLIAM JORDAN.

William Jordan, a widely known and highly respected citizen, died Saturday night last, at 11 o'clock, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. C. Milmore. The health of deceased had been failing for some months, but he had not been confined to the house for any length of time. Mr. Jordan was 77 years of age. A son, Henry, of Houlton, was at his bedside shortly before his death. The funeral took place Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock, to St. Gertrude's Church, where a requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Chapman, and thence the remains were taken to Houlton for interment.

MRS. BENJAMIN EVERETT.

On April 17th, the wife of Benjamin Everett, living about four miles from Washburn village, passed on to the life beyond. Mrs. Everett came with her husband from Jacksonville, N. B., about six years ago. Although not strong, she had been in her usual health till ten days before her death. She was one of those quiet, cheerful women, who fill so large a place in the home. In her youth she united with the Baptist church near her home and on coming to Washburn, she and her husband became connected with the Baptist church there. The funeral services were held at the school house in the Everett neighborhood, April 18, and were conducted by Rev. C. E. Young.

GEORGE WILSON.

The death of Geo. Wilson, at the advanced age of 74 years, took place at his residence, Bellville, on Wednesday last week. He leaves to mourn, four sons and four daughters. The funeral service, Saturday, was conducted by Rev. A. W. Teed. There was a large attendance, and interment was at the Parish Church grave yard.

The body of an infant of Mrs. Copping, which had been born during the process of the fire, was found with its mother.
