We might also fancy him seated upon his throne, calling around his servants to show their claims for reward, by the power one possessed more than another in bringing men to ruin.

While all is silent, we may suppose a mighty rumbling sound, and far in the distance is seen, borne upon the fiery tide, a monstrous being. "Who art thou?" "I am an earth-born spirit. I heard your summons, and am come—send me. I will turn the hand of the father against the mother, the mother against her child, the husband against his wife, the wife against her husband; the young man in the pride of his manliness, I will wrap in my celerment and wither him; that fair young girl I will make such a thing that the vilest wretch will shrink from her in disgust.

"I will do more. I will so deceive them, that the mother shall know I destroyed her first-born and give me her second. The father shall know I destroyed the pride of his hope, and yet lift the deadly draught to the lips of the second. Governors shall know how I have sapped the roots of States, and spread over me their protection. Legislators shall know the crime and misery I cause, but shall still shield and encourage me. In heathen lands, I shall be called firewater, spirit of the devil; but in Christendom men shall call me a good creature of God."

The Dwelling Place of Crime.

The 'blue book' of the year's criminal statistics has just been issued by the Department of Agriculture. Though there are half a hundred catalogued offences, to one single item, drunkenness, is accredited 27 percent of all the convictions in the country. Besides this, 51 percent of the convictions were for infractions of the liquor license laws. It appears, then, that one-third of all convictions have to do with liquor directly, quite apart from all the crime which has liquor in one way or another for its inciting cause. The next largest class of indictments, those for vagrancy and for being loose, idle or disorderly, are so closely related to the use of liquor that they may be classed with these, thus bringing the total for drink offences up to 45 percent, or nearly one half of all the indictments. Could there be a stronger argument for the necessity of temperance legislation? Next to the evil effect of liquor come the effect of the crowding of people together in cities as a generator of crime. Of all indictable offences last year 83 percent were committed in cities or towns, despite the fact that more than half our population is rural. Take the Province of Quebec, for example. In the judicial district of Montreal one hundred people for every ten thousand of population were committed last year for drunkenness, vagrancy or for committing assaults, while in the rest of the Province of Quebec, outside of Montreal, only ten people per ten thousand were convicted on these counts. That is to say, Montreal appears ten times as criminal as the province in which it lies. The disparity between city and country is really much greater than this, for the judicial district of Montreal contains seven rural counties which lessen its criminality while the rest of the province contains a number of cities which greatly increase the reported criminality there. As far as the records go Montreal is probably not less than twenty times as criminal as the surrounding country in which it lies. How far the difference reported is due to the more complete police arrangements of the cities making arrest and conviction far more probable in them, it is, of course, impossible to say, but one would gather that living in the country is not only physically but morally wholesome. While the agricultural class form a large percentage of our population, they only commit 3.8 percent of the recorded crimes and misdemeanors. The 'blue book' points out that 92 percent of all criminals had only an elementary education, or none at all. Another interesting fact is that while one-half of the total popula-

tion of the country over thirteen years of age are married 70 percent of crime is committed by the unmarried. This is probably largely due to the fact that the unbalanced years of adolescence are most prolific in reckless misdemeanor. The moral would seem to be: acquire something real in the shape of education, do not drink, get married as soon as you can, and live on a farm. If this prescription is carried out one's chances of becoming a criminal recede and become infinitesimal, something like one in a million.—Exchange.

Canada's Increasing Trade

NOT ONLY ENCOURAGING, BUT MARVELOUS.

Canada's aggregate trade for the five months ending November 30th last, was \$189,543,132, an increase of over \$13,000,000 as compared with the same time last year. At this rate of growth, the year's business will be considerably over the \$400,000,000 mark. The total imports for the five months was \$84,412,717, a gain of \$7,313,513 on the same period of 1900. The exports totalled \$125,430,415, an increase of \$5,940,095 over the same period last year. The general opinion expressed has been that Canada has reached a point in its trade when increases could scarcely be looked for, and if it remained stationary for a time that was about all that could be expected. But the returns of the foreign business done are more than encouraging—they are marvelous. During the past five years the growth of our trade will be greater than in the previous twenty. The figures of the five months show that the sales abroad were greater by

\$21,000,000 than the amount of foreign goods brought into Canada. By those who have had homemade goods to sell, this will be a feature specially gratifying to them. For the month of November alone the sales abroad amounted to \$24,148,419, an increase of \$2,373,227 over the same period last year. The imports for November are given at \$17,448,239, an increase of \$3,643,096. The duty collected for the five months was over \$13,000,000, an increase of nearly \$1,000,000 over the same time in 1900.

Tourist Traffic Over I. C. R. Last Year.

John M. Lyons, general passenger agent of the I. C. R., arrived in the city this morning from Boston and New York, where he has been spending a few days on business in connection with the government railway system.

During his stay in these cities Mr. Lyons heard nothing but praise from the American tourists who have travelled over the I. C. R. and the I. C. R. transportation connections during the past summer. In New York Mr. Lyons had an interview with George H. Daniels, general passenger agent of the New York Central railway system, who made the statement that Americans are more and more going to Canada, and the maritime provinces in particular, to spend their holidays, and so far as he has heard they are loud with praises for the service over the I. C. R. and the attention given them by the employees of the road.

Speaking of the service between New York and the maritime provinces Mr. Lyons said that it is all that can be desired. Leaving New York at 6.25 in the evening over the New York Central, and connecting with the I. C. R. at Montreal, the Sydneys can be reached the following night, meaning but two nights on the road. At North Sydney immediate connection can be made by steamer Bruce for Newfoundland, just six hours' sail across to Port Basque, and in another twenty-four hours St. Johns is reached by rail. On the entire journey from New York to St. Johns, Nfld., the traveller is provided with all the comforts of home.

Speaking of the traffic over the I. C. R. during the past summer Mr. Lyons said that it has shown a considerable increase over previous seasons, and that there is every indication that next season will show a still larger increase. Mr. Lyons leaves this evening for Toronto.—Montreal Star.
