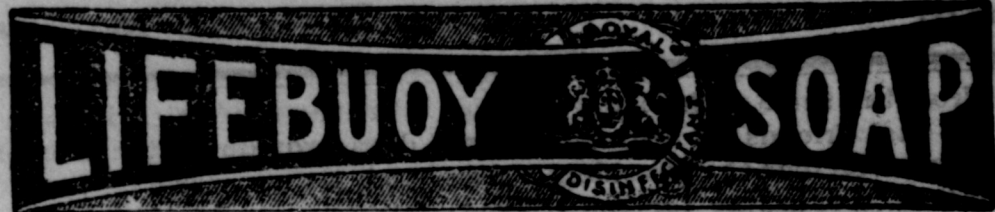

Is Temperance Reform a Success.

"The Christian Commonwealth" discusses in an able manner the question as to whether Temperance reform has been a success. The Temperance movement, it says, has been hastily assumed to be one of the declining interests of the age. Much ridicule has been expended by editors of drink literature on the present position of Temperance reform. It is true that there has been a Bacchanalian revival, and a concurrent flagging in the enthusiasm of British abstainers. The anti-alcoholic legions have seemed inclined to arrange an armistice. But what else could have been expected? Nothing is more superficially and illogically frivolous than a hasty generalisation based on transient phenomena. The truth is that no Jericho drops its walls quickly. We deny that there is any danger of decadence in Temperance principles. The strange and sad reaction of recent times have affected every noble cause in some adverse measure, but civilization is intermittent in its advance. Popular progress is always along zig-zag lines. Tidal currents ebb and flow in that progress, and there are eddies and backwaters in the stream. What is manifest to all who can observe accurately is a perfect revolution in natural sentiment. It is only in our own time that a Children's Bill could even be introduced into Parliament. Storms are brewing, but it is on the heads of publican, brewer, and distiller that they will break.

The most important feature in the Temperance movement is its new international character. While there has certainly been a temporary decline of zeal in our own land, as if reformers had grown weary of prolonged and arduous efforts, a marvellous development has ensued in nearly every other civilized country. Most wonderful of all is the position in Russia, where the late Czar and his Finance Minister, M. Nishnegradsky, conceived the most colossal scheme for revolutionizing the drink traffic ever thought of. In the Russian Empire about one-half of the Rabaks, or public houses, now belong to the Czar, for Nicholas II., and his present Minister of Finance, M. Witte, inaugurated the vast enterprise five years ago. In the country Temperance societies are springing up, subsidised by the Government. Of the result of the Czar's economies of alcoholism we do not here speak. In Scandinavia, in Belgium, in France wonderful Temperance interests have been growing up of late years, and even in Roumania work of the same kind is being taken up with vigor and with zeal. Of America, the great political, sociological, and religious laboratory of the world, whole pages might be written in merely outlining what has been done and what is going on. The United States and Canada are rivalling each other in strenuous anti-alcoholic enterprises.

Taking a glance at the whole world round, it becomes at once evident that there is in process a cosmopolitan advance in Temperance work of the most positive character, for South Africa, India, and Australasia are scenes of activity which is absolutely irrepressible and magnificently successful. Let our reformers at home, if they are sometimes naturally discouraged, recollect that the race is slowly but steadily moving in the right direction. The retrograde is sectional and transient. The onward march is massive and irresistible.

Our deeds hurry before us to open or bar the way. To learn the worth of man's religion do business with him. Nothing is so attractive as the simplicity and earnestness of a great mind. Great Cycling Feature.

The star feature at the pavilion in London, England, this season, is the extraordinary cycling performance of Charles Jones. There are men who do some daring acts on their wheels on the stage nowadays on wires stretched at a dizzy height. Among the trick performers is a one-legged man who can ride better and more gracefully than some of the most expert bicyclist, another who makes a turn while balancing half a dozen men, but the work of Charles Jones is marvellous.

This agile rider uses a track which is built at an angle of sixty degrees and which is open toward the stage. To the uninitiated it seems impossible that any bicyclist could balance his wheel on this even for a few seconds. Mr. Jones' most remarkable feat consists of removing the upper portions of his clothing while cycling at fully speed without using the handle bar. All the power used for the regulation of speed, the propulsion of his wheel, and the maintenance of the proper equipoise on the difficult track is concentrated in his lower limbs.

A Remarkable Woman.

A remarkable woman was Rebecca Wampler, better known as Aunt Becky, who died last week at Dublin, Ind., aged 100 years. She probably had the record for broken bones. At the age of 6 years she fell from a picket fence and broke her ankle, in 1865 she fell down cellar and broke her collarbone and three ribs, in 1885, in a runaway, while returning from church, she was thrown from a vehicle and her right hip broken; in 1888 she slipped and fell on the pavement, breaking her left hip; in 1892 she broke her left leg at the knee, in 1896 she fell from a tree, breaking her left arm; in 1898 she fell out of bed, breaking her right arm, and in 1900 she broke her right hip for the second time.

FROM THREE MINUTES TO TWO.

Within the memory of living man a three-minute trotter was pretty sure to throw his dust in the face of anything on the road. Then came the period when "2.40 tail over the dashboard" was expressive of the limit of the trotter's speed. Oliver Wendell Holmes, in his poem on "Contentment," remarked that he would be satisfied with a nag that could do 2.40, though a few seconds less would have given him the pole against all rivals.

But the real attack of the trotter on time began with Flora Temple's stepping out of the 2.30 class and establishing a record from which the descent has been almost by single sections or fractions of seconds down to that of Cresceus. How the seconds have been clipped off is shown in the following table:
