Methodists and Temperance.

A discussion upon temperance was  
probably the most stirring debate  
that took place during the great  
Methodist Ecumenical Conference  
in City Road Chapel, London, Eng.,  
last week. One of the liveliest  
speeches was that of Rev. A. B.  
Leonard, of New York, whose stir-  
ring remarks made strikingly mani-  
fest the difference between the posi-  
tion of the Methodist churches of  
North America and those of Great  
Britain.

Dr. Leonard said that the church  
which he represented laid it down  
that the complete local prohibition  
of strong drink was the first duty of  
civil government. He was a little  
surprised that their Wesleyan friends  
on this side of the water were de-  
bating the question as to whether a  
liquor dealer could hold office in  
the church. The mere raising of  
such a question as that in America  
would be regarded as a very strange  
procedure. They had gone far be-  
yond that. They struck at the very  
root of the whole matter, and said  
that no man should be a member of  
the Methodist Episcopal Church  
who drank liquor or manufactured  
or sold it. The drink habit and the  
drink traffic were Siamese twins, and  
could not be separated without the  
destruction of both. To effectually  
close the saloon in America on Sun-  
days they must abolish it altogether.  
The saloon in his country was the  
hot-bed of political corruption, and  
the politician avoided the temper-  
ance crusade.

Commenting on the attitude of the  
Commander-in-Chief, Lord Wolsey,  
and Lord Roberts towards the prac-  
tice of 'treating,' the *Lancet*, (Eng-  
land), looks for a reform and adds:  
"The word of our great soldiers  
will prove, particularly at this jun-  
cture, to be more powerful in the re-  
form of our absurd drinking customs  
than the sermons of preachers or the  
opinions of men of science, and will  
counterbalance the harm done by  
the extreme dogmas of fanatics.

What is true for the army is true for  
the whole population and especially  
true for those who live by labor, who  
need to spend wisely what they  
make, and who can only rise in the  
social scale by strength of character  
and self-denial. Laboring families  
must suffer some degree of starva-  
tion if a third or a fourth of the  
wages which they earn go into the  
coffers of the publican instead of in-  
to the coffers of the butcher, the  
dairyman and the tailor. The prac-  
tice of 'treating' is wholly bad, be-  
cause it leads to casual drinking, a  
habit which lays the foundation of  
disease. It lessens the sound nour-  
ishment of families. It promotes  
laziness. It degrades the sentiment  
of self-respect and takes the fine  
edge off many moral qualities. It  
powerfully antagonizes the remedies  
of the physician and of the moralist  
alike."—*Weekly Herald*.

## A Method That Fails.

Some weeks ago a woman appear-  
ed before Magistrate Denison in the  
Toronto Police Court, charged with  
drunkenness, and the statement was  
made that she had previously been  
there on a similar charge exactly  
one hundred times. One hundred  
times the magistrate had passed  
judgment upon her case, and it looked  
as if she was likely to continue  
coming before him as long as phys-  
ical strength would permit her to  
do so. What an absurdity it is to  
attempt to remedy inebriety by the  
common police court method of im-  
posing a fine or an alternative im-  
prisonment.

The Fredericton Religious Intelli-  
gencer recently reported and com-  
mented upon even a worse case of  
the same kind in the following  
terms: "At the age of sixty years,  
after having served 316 sentences on  
fines of \$5 to \$10, miserable Mary  
O'Brien died in the Cook County In-  
firm, in Chicago, a victim of al-  
coholism. Arrested and sentenced  
16 times for drunkenness! Think  
of it! And this was the best that  
this foremost Christian government  
of the twentieth century of the  
Christian era could do for a poor  
rum-cursed woman! Somebody will  
have an awful claim to settle when  
the Son of Man takes the judgment  
throne."

Eight deaths of children have been  
reported to the St. Louis Health De-  
partment as the result of lockjaw,  
due, it is asserted by the physicians,  
to the administration of the city bac-  
teriologist's specially prepared anti-  
toxin for diphtheria. Eleven other  
children are ill with lockjaw, and  
death is expected in each case. Nine-  
teen cases of lockjaw among chil-  
dren have therefore been reported  
as a direct result of the administra-  
tion of the infected anti-toxine.
