COUNTY COUNCIL.

assessed on Richmond for poor purposes, and \$350 for Aberdeen.

Coun Kearney referred to the fact that a merry-go-round came into this county from Aroostook last year and that they took upwards of \$2,000 from the county. He moved that a license of \$400 be imposed on any such concern.

Coun Bohan thought the license would be too high.

Coun McDonald doubted if the county had the power.

The secretary treasurer said that the county would have the right.

Coun McDonald moved in amendment that the license be \$20. No second.

Coun Gallagher moved in amendment that the license be \$200.

Coun Kearney thought the merry-go-rounds were no good for the county. They rather led to immorality.

Coun Williams thought they were a temptation to old men and women as well as children.

Coun Gallagher thought also they were a menace to good morals. Whiskey was generally sold by peddlers who follow them up.

Coun Giberson would prohibit the merry-go-rounds altogether.

The original motion carried by a large majority.

Coun Williams moved that the councillors be paid \$1 per day instead of \$2. Coun Carvell seconded the motion.

Coun Williams said there was a large deficit. He meant to move a reduction in the salaries of all the officials. By passing this vote, \$75 would be saved a year. It was true, councillors did not make much money with the present pay; if we intend practising economy we should start on ourselves. He had been a councillor for years when no pay was received, and he was willing to have it reduced to \$1 per day.

Coun Carvell said he seconded the motion because he was asked to. Next, he believed in Coun Williams' heart he did not wish the motion to go through. He believed Coun Williams would be the most disappointed man of the Council of the motion carried. (Laughter.) He was seeking a little favor from his constituents.

Coun Merrithew did not agree with the motion, which was defeated by an overwhelming majority. The mover and seconder only voted in favor.

The committee on accounts reported through Coun Bailey. He said the committee met last night and had a late session. They found it quite difficult to make an intelligent report from the fact that they were unable to consult with the different councillors who had the necessary information about certain bills. However, they went carefully over the bills and marked some of them O K; on the back of others they asked for further information, which could be given by the councillors as they were read by the warden. With regard to the Scott Act report, which they examined carefully, they could not find all the vouchers. They thought the accounts were kept in a peculiar manner, for it appeared there were two treasurers—Colpitts and Hartley. The committee thought the inspector should not pay his own salary, but should put in his bill to the Council as other officers do.

Inspector Colpitts report of the working of the Scott Act during the year, showed that receipts were \$1,668.19. After all expenses were paid there is a sum of \$112.50 on hand.

Coun Bohan wanted to know what authority the Inspector had to hire a detective. The detective work should be done by himself. There were two bills for detective work, one for \$30 and one for \$15.

Coun Merrithew asked why there were not vouchers for all the items in the Inspector's account. There was a charge of \$42 and no vouchers. He moved that Mr Colpitts be heard in regard to the bill. Carried.

Inspector Colpitts, referring to the bill of \$42, said the party went to the woods before he could get a voucher. The party was a detective on Albert Demerchant—six cases, \$42 in all; the voucher would be forthcoming. In the other case, Worth, a detective, got away and he could not get a voucher from him.

Coun Bohan said it would be better for Mr Colpitts to do the work and hire no detectives.

Mr Colpitts—They won't sell to me.

Coun Bohan—I think there is a lot of perjury as a result of this hiring of detectives.

The Inspector said that in two cases three hundred dollars came into the treasury as a result of private information. He could not give the names of those parties.

Coun Merrithew moved that the Scott Act Inspector be requested to furnish a number of cases for the last year by 3 o'clock this afternoon, and that the bill lie on the table till that time.

The motion was seconded by Coun Bohan and carried.

Coun Bailey's verbal report on the accounts was received and the different accounts were read by the warden from the chair.

Moved Coun Gallagher, seconded Coun Bailey, that the bill of D. R. Willet, \$15, for engraving address, be paid when allowed to be carried.

On motion the bill of C. Bates & Co. was referred to the councillors for Northampton.

On motion Coun Gallagher, seconded Coun Merrithew the bill of Z. Demerchant, \$150 was refused payment.

On motion the bill of Dr. Ross, \$19.50 was paid less \$7.10 over charge.

Herbert Jones put in a bill for \$185, at \$1 a day for taking charge of the temporary gaol in the court house since June session. There was some discussion on this item, but it was ordered paid after explanation.

Coun Saunders explained that in the new gaol there are 32 lights put in. The charge for installing was \$2 a light. The lights then become the property of the county. The contract for lighting is with Connell because his lights run all night. A meter is put in so that we only pay for what we use.

After the noon adjournment:—\$600 was ordered assessed on Wakefield for poor purposes, \$400 on the front and \$200 on each of the back districts. \$500 was ordered assessed on parish of Woodstock for poor; \$275 on Wilmot. \$150 was ordered assessed on Upper Woodstock for road purposes, \$100 for road and \$50 for sidewalks, and that Judson Burpee be the commissioner.

Everett Kearney was granted a license to run a ferry between Bath and Wicklow.

Coun Lamont moved that the old board of valuers consisting of John McLaughlin, Theodore Estey, John R. Ronald, be re-appointed.

Coun Williams seconded the motion.

Coun Merrithew thought one valuator should be from Richmond and moved in amendment that Jas. R. Barton be a valuator in place of Theodore Estey.

Coun Kearney—We want one in Simonds too.

Coun Kearney moved an amendment to the amendment that Denis McGaffigan be appointed in place of John R. Ronald.

Coun Gallagher thought if any change was made as suggested, a man at the lower end should be dropped, particularly if the new appointee was to be from that section.

The original motion was carried.

The bills of the Board of Health re. small pox epidemic was taken up.

Dr. Curtis, chairman of the county Board of Health was heard on motion.

Dr. Curtis speaking of the case in Brookville and the cost of handling it amounting to \$250, said that sum included all the expense. Dr. Baristo's bill had not been sent to the Board of Health. The bills have all been certified by the local Boards of Health and with the exception of some small ones of the Provincial Board also. When men boarded at home we got men to work cheaper than men who had to board out, this accounted for the discrepancy between the pay to guards.

Dr. Curtis said it must be remembered that the epidemic existed six or eight weeks before it was noticed by Dr. Hand who notified Dr. Fisher, secretary of the provincial board of health, and he came to the county and pronounced the cases small pox. He was not engaged by Dr. Fisher but, as chairman of the County board, he took a hand in the matter. In answer to a question if the Council had any right to pay a bill presented for the board of a quarantined man, he said he did not think so, for if the net thrown out caught a man in a quarantined district, the man should stand the loss for board.

Coun Williams said that a good deal of complaint was made at employing Mr Fields at \$3.50 a day. As good a man could have been secured for less money.

Dr. Curtis said that time was precious, and Mr. Fields was secured at once. He proved a good man and as for his wages when he paid expenses he did not think there would be much in it for him.

Coun Cartell said that he was informed that the council had nothing to say about the pay. The board of health contracted the bill and the county must pay it. He wanted the people to see the position we are in.

The Sec. Treas. said the local board of health had larger powers than any other body in the county. If an epidemic breaks out they must take charge of it. If they do not they are liable for a penalty of \$40 for every case not suppressed. They ask the county council to assess the necessary amount, if the council does not assess the amount, the provincial secretary calls on the warden to show cause why the amount should not be assessed. If they show cause well and good, if not an order is made on the sec. treas. for the amount, and the county must recoup themselves as best they can. When bills are approved by the provincial board of health, the council would certainly have a reason for resisting payment. The custom has been for the county to pay the bills, and the provincial government makes a grant to the county.

Coun Williams wanted to know if Dr. Fisher Prov. Sec. came here and set the doctors' fees, which they could take or not.

Dr. Curtis said that Dr. Fisher engaged Drs. Sprague and Hand, and that he informed them that \$12 a day was the fee the government would likely allow.

Coun Gallagher moved that the bill be paid as soon as possible.

Coun McDonald second the motion.

Carried.

Coun Merrithew was told by Dr. Cur-

The Majority in the Senate.

Ottawa, Jan. 15.—The political complexion of the Senate is rapidly changing, and the old-time Conservative majority has almost disappeared.

At the present time the Upper Chamber is composed of 43 Conservatives and 34 Liberals. Senator Prowse's death increases the vacancies to four. These will be filled by the appointment of supporters of the Government, so that when Parliament meets the Liberals will number 38, as against 43 Conservatives.

This would give the Opposition of five. As, however, a number of Conservative members may be unable to attend, and in fact have not lately been attending, owing to their advanced age, it is quite possible that the coming session may witness a Liberal majority in the Senate on a straight party vote for the first time in many years.

When the four vacancies in the Senate have been filled, it will make thirty appointments to that body by the Laurier Government in five and a half years, as against forty-one appointments by Conservative ministers in eighteen years, the difference being due largely to the number of old Senators who have been dying.

The last Conservative to be called to the Senate was Hon. Louis J. Forget, appointed June 15, 1896, just 8 days before the Tupper Government met with its disastrous defeat. The first Liberal called to the Senate by the Laurier Government was Hon. Alfred A. Thibaudeau, on Aug. 22, 1896.

The Seat of the Soul.

Detroit, Mich., Jan 14.—Prof. Lombard of Ann Arbor, instructor of physiology in the University of Michigan, believes that he has located the dwelling place of the soul in the spinal column. He has arrived at this conclusion after many months of experiments with frogs.

Result of the last two days' experiments seem to demonstrate that death through the medium of the brain does not terminate the control of the muscles. Thursday the professor produced before his class a live frog, from which he removed the brain. It was then suspended by its under jaw. An hour later a drop of acetic acid was touched to its foot. Instantly the frog began to jerk and twitch to get away from the stings of the acid. Twenty-four hours later a tiny bit of filter paper saturated with acid was placed against the body. The frog kicked with both legs and dislodged the paper, placed upon its back, the paper was taken off. Every time it was placed on any part of the body the legs sent it flying.

Prof. Lombard calls this activity "reason movements," and will continue the experiments for the purpose of ascertaining how far the reasoning instinct may go.

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
