A SERIOUS FIRE.

Our firemen and citizens were aroused from their slumbers about 2.30 Tuesday morning by the clanging of the fire bell and screeching | ing raining quite briskly. of the whistle at the water works station. The fire proved to be in the wooden building belonging to the estate of the late Wm. Lindsay, just south of the Town Hall, occupied in the lower flat by Fisher & Connell as a law office, and R. E. Holyoke as a grocery; the upper flat by Dr. E. S. Kirkpatrick as dental offices. The fire had made considerable progress before the firemen reached the spot although they responded to the alarm call with good speed. The fire had worked its way in between the partitions and behind the sheathing and proved a hard one to fight. It was some hours before the firemen won the mastery and conwas a bitter cold one, but the firemen heeded not cold or danger, but stuck manfully to their posts until the danger was all past. The outside of the building was partially saved, but the contents of R. E Holvoke's store and Dr. Kirkpatrick's offices were largely destroyed or greatly damaged. Mr. Holyoke's loss is in the neighborhood of \$1500 or \$1600, on which he has an insurance of \$800; Dr. Kirkpatrick's offices were elegantly fitted up and furnished with the latest and most improved apparatus, all of which he lost. Samples of Choice Grain for the Improvement of Seed.

To the Editor of the Sentinel: DEAR SIR, -By Instructions of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another distribution will be made this season of samples of the most productive sorts of grain to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. It promises to be a great success. The stock for distribution is of the very best and has been secured by the Director of the Experimental Farms from the record-breaking crops recently had in the Canadian North-west. It will be worth while for farmers generally to renew their seed of oats when varieties which have produced more than 100 bushels per acre can be had. The distribution this Spring will consist of samples of oats, Spring wheat, barley, field pease, Indian corn and potatoes.
