### MARTINIQUE.

The horrible calamity by which St. Pierre, Martinique, has been completely destroyed is likened to the fate which overtook Pompeii in 79 A D which has preserved to us an instantaneous photograph of the life of the world of luxury at the time when Christianity entered it. There was a occurrence, too, in Callao in Aug. 18-68, when many thousands perished, and it third time that Callao had suffered. Contemporary accounts of the fall of Pompeii, especially the restrained letter of Pliny the younger, bring us very near to feel the overwhelming horror of such catastrophes. There is the first activity of the volcano, little noticed, perhaps then the column of black smoke, expanding like an umbrella pine, assuming the proportions of a swarthy cloud, dense with ashes, pumice and red hot stones, and settling down on the doomed city. Then there is impenetrable gloom and panic indescribable, an attempt at flight in which few are successful, and afterwards for the city desolation and for the surviving citizens much distress. The belching forth of Mount Pelee must have been terribly swift as forty thousand lives are said to have been lost, and of the nineteen vessels in the harbor only one escaped, and that in a most deplorable condition. Many of the crew were killed and the survivors were so seized with horror of it that they say that they have had 'glimpses of hell.' Of the forty thousand souls that are said to have been so suddenly called to account it seems that about a thousand were white, including a few Englishmen, and it is reported that the Quebec Steamship Company's 'Roraima' blew up and disappeared, and that a number of Quebecers were killed, which brings the disaster very close to home indeed. The accounts at present to hand may, let us hope, err on the side of exaggeration, so far as the number of lives lost is concerned, but further accounts can do nothing to lessen the painfulness of the calamity, rather, further details must add to it. It is a case where the world is called upon not only for sympathy but for something more substantial—Montreal Times.

According to the Telegraph's Pretoria correspondent, the Boer discussions at Vereeniging have been acrimonious even to the point of quarrelling, the irreconcilables trying to force the hands of the conference.

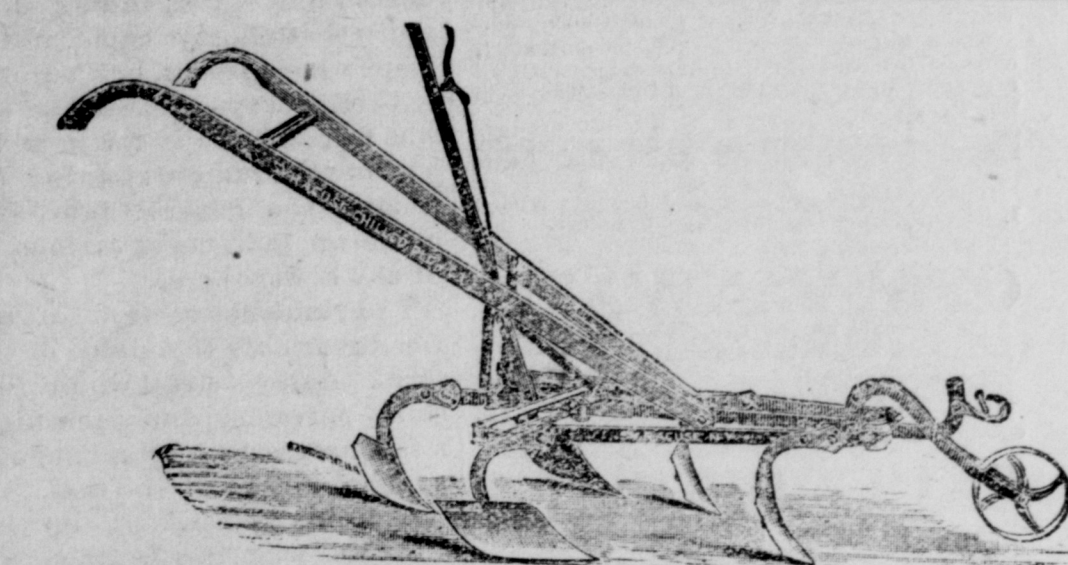
