THE WASTE OF WAR.

The meaning of the promised reduction of the military force in the Philippines to 18,000 men may be better appreciated perhaps when it is stated in terms of education. To support an American army on a peace footing costs something over a thousand dollars per man. Warlike operations, of course, cost more. Every regiment of a thousand men, therefore, is equivalent in expense to a university like Columbia. Nine thousand men on garrison duty in the Philippines, making no allowance for campaigns, use up as much money as all the colleges and universities in New England and the Middle States combined, including Harvard, Yale, Columbia, Cornell, Princeton, the University of Pennsylvania and Johns Hopkins. When the promised reduction is made we shall have brought home 25,000 men from our Philippine army in a little over two £51. Have two staircases, one to go hup years. But without going into all the pros and cons, it is interesting to calculate how much better off Britain would now be supposing it had been possible for her to arrange her difficulties with other nations, to extend her colonial dominion, and to gain her present political freedom without fighting; and supposing also that it was not necessary henceforward to keep going the costliest army and navy in the world.

In the first place, going back only 350 years, we find that Britain has spent £1,500,000,000 on her various foreign, colonial and civil quarrels, and lost about 1,800,000 men. Now it is calculated that the average 25 year old man will earn, before he dies £300, in addition to what it costs to feed, clothe and house him. If you kill a man aged 25 you make the country £300 poorer. We may safely put these 1,800,000 picked men, therefore, as worth £300 each, so that in losing them the country lost \$540,-000,000. The Boer War alone has cost Britain 20,000 men in the prime of life, whose deaths have caused the country to be £6,000,000 poorer. Add that to the cash spent and you get the startling fact that Great Britain would to day be £2,245,000,-000 richer but for its wars. This sum, divided equally among the inhabi
