How Districts are Pacified.

London, Oct. 22.—The following information, says a St. Petersburg correspondent, is from a source hitherto perfectly trustworthy, and throws a vivid light on the methods employed to 'pacify' the disturbed districts. At the recent trial of some Kharkoff peasants charged with complicity in disorders in the spring, the counsel for the defence, eight Moscow lawyers of some position, attempted to question the accused in regard to their treatment by soldiers. The president of the court refused to allow these questions. The lawyers then read a declaration to the effect that they could not continue pleading after the president's decision.

They had wished to adduce proof that the peasants had already been sufficiently punished by the draconian they had received. Men had been mercilessly flogged, and great numbers of women had been assaulted by soldiers. Ultimately the defence was entrusted to a local lawyer appointed by the court. The peasants were sentenced to comparatively light punishment, ranging from six months' imprisonment upwards.

Infringement of a Trade-Mark.

In action for The High Court of Justice for Ontario recently tried before Chancellor Boyd at Toronto, The Slater Shoe Co., and Chas. E. Slater, President, of Montreal, makers of the famous Slater Shoe, obtained a judgement forever restraining F. C. Wilkinson a boot & shoe dealer of Owen Sound from advertising, offering, exposing for sale or selling boots or shoes not made by the Slater Shoe Co., as 'Slater Shoe', 'Slater Goods' or 'The Slater Shoe'. The Chancellor also ordered Wilkinson to pay the heavy costs of the action.

It seems Wilkinson was offering for sale, shoes made by a manufacturer in Montreal whose name was somewhat similar to The Slater Shoe Co. This maker came up from Montreal and gave evidence at the trial and appeared to be looking after the defence for Wilkinson, but the Chancellor after hearing the evidence decided that no one, except the Slater Shoe Co., had a right to use the name 'Slater Shoes', 'Slater Goods', 'The Slater Shoe', or any similar names in connection with boots and shoes, and that Wilkinson had no right to use any name or names in connection with boots and shoes which might enable him to pass off a shoe not of the Company's make, as being of their make, nor in any way to reap the benefit of the reputation which the Slater Shoe has acquired throughout the Dominion of Canada.

The crown agents for the colonies have ordered form Massey-Harris Co., Toronto, 2,000 zig-zag barrows for use in South Africa. This order is worth at least between \$40,000 and \$50,000. The Canadian department of agriculture has been asked to have them properly inspected before shipment. This is the first order for Canadian farming machinery for South Africa.

Official reports show Canada possesses far more extensive anthracite areas than those in Pennsylvania, the closing of which have brought about such serious consequences. The coal famine will greatly hasten the development of these areas as well as all bituminous areas east and west.

Miss Kate Livingstone, a sister of the famous explorer, who has just celebrated her one hundred and seventh birthday, is still in fairly good health, and retains her mind unaffected beyond what would naturally be expected in normal old age.

## WELL KEPT HANDS.

## Origin of the Months' Names.

January was named after the Roman god, Janus, the deity with two faces, one looking into the past and the other gazing forward to the future. February comes from the Latin word februa, to purify. It was customary for the Romans to observe festivals of purification during that month. March owes its name to the old god of War. Among the Saxons this month was known as Lenct, meaning spring; and this is the origin of our word Lent. April was named from the Latin aperio, to open, in signification of flowers. The Saxons called the month Eastre, in honor of their goddess of Spring, from which comes our word Easter. May was named after the Roman goddess Maia, and June was so-called in honor of Juno. July was named in honor of Julius Caesar, and August gets its name from Augustus Caesar. September is from the Latin septem, seven, this being the seventh month according to the old Roman calendar, October, November and December also retain the names by which they were known under the old calendar, when there were but ten months in a year—octo, novem, and decem meaning eight, nine and ten.
