The owner of the manor of Liston, in Essex, presents for the feast wafers "made of sugar, almonds, ginger, saffron and other things"; he holds his estate by the service of these wafers. An earl carves for the King, another noble carves for the Queen. The menu of coronation banquets is never a modest one. It includes such items as 1,-610 chickens, 720 pullets and capons, 520 hens, 160 geese, 8400 eggs, 400 pounds of beef, 7133 pounds of veal, 2474 pounds of mutton, 160 sweetbreads, 550 pounds of lard, 912 pounds of butter, 1190 side dishes of various sorts, 220 of mounted pastry, 320 of small pastry and 400 of jellies and cream. Among the ornamental dishes such things as white lions swimming in red soup, golden leopards immersed in custards, roast pigs, gilt like gingerbread, frillers like the sun, the head of a pard crowned with ostrich feathers. - Leslie's
