The recent auction sale at Hood Farm, Lowell, Mass., dispersed 154 beautiful Jerseys to breeders and farmers all over the country from Maine to Oregon, it being the largest and most successful sale of American-bred Jersey breeders in this country for years. There was an attendance of over 500, there being 58 different buyers, comprising the best known Jersey breeders in the country. The sale was conducted by Peter C. Kellogg of New York.

The 48 cows sold brought \$9165, an average of \$190, 67 heifers and calves sold for \$5890, and 39 bulls and bull calves brought \$2895. Thirty head by the great show bull Hood Farm Pogs sold for \$3810; 19 by Toronto for \$2907; 8 by Sophie's Tormentor for \$2296, an average of \$287; 8 by Brown Bessie's Son, \$1200 and 8 by Chromo, \$824. Three young heifers by Hood Farm Pogs 9th, brought \$655, an average of \$218.

The remarkably good prices brought by the young heifers of Hood Farm Pogs 9th show that breeders appreciate the great breeding represented in this young bull and his progeny. None of these heifers are in milk, their average age being about 14 months. One of them brought \$330, this being the highest price paid for any female not in milk. Hood Farm Pogs 9th is retained at the head of the Hood Farm herd. He is a son of the famous cow Figgis, by the great show bull Hood Farm Pogs. Figgis herself was the great plum of the sale and was bought by the well known banker and copper magnate, Mr. Thomas W. Lawson of Boston. The price paid was \$875.

This sale reduces the Hood Farm herd to a more convenient basis for business, and the young stock from the great producing sires and dams at Hood Farm will continue to be in demand among progressive breeders. Besides others, the herd now contains 30 daughters and granddaughters of Hood Farm Pogs, 35 daughters and granddaughters of Sophie's Tormentor and 10 daughters of Hood Farm Pogs 9th.

The famous imported Berkshire boar Sambo, which Mr. Hood himself bought in England two years ago, was purchased by Charles F. Mills of Springfield, Ills., for \$150, and about 50 other choice Berkshires were sold at average prices which showed that the demand for this breed of hogs is good.

Ceaseless Growth of Ears.

INTERESTING OBSERVATIONS OF EXAMINERS OF THESE HUMAN APPENDAGES.

The systematic examination of more than 40,000 pairs of human ears in England and France has resulted in some interesting conclusions. For one thing, it is ascertained that the ear continues to grow in the later decades of life; in fact, it appears never to stop growing until death. If one will take the trouble to look around in any assembly of people, as at church, he will discover that the old folks have ears considerably larger than those of the middle aged. A woman, who has small, shell-like ears, at 20 years of age, will be very apt to possess medium sized ears at 40 and large ears at 60. Why ears should go on growing all one's life, any more than noses, is a mystery. There are a good many other points about them that are instructive, their shapes being markedly persistent through heredity. An ear will be handed down, so to speak, from father to son for generation after generation with comparatively little modification. Some authorities on criminology assert that criminals are very apt to possess a peculiar sort of ear, which is recognizable by an expert in such matters.

There is probably nobody in the

world who has a pair of ears perfectly matched; in most people the two differ perceptibly not only in shape, but also in size. Frequently they are not placed precisely alike on the head. The age of a person may be judged with great accuracy by the ears, which, after youth is past, assume an increasing harshness of contour. A pretty woman whose first youth has departed, may not show the fact in other ways, but these tell-tale features will surely tell the story of the flight of time. Then there is the little wrinkle that comes just in front of each ear during the thirties—a fatal and ineradicable sign.

Near the top of each ear, just within the downturned edge and slightly towards the back, will be found, if one feels for it, a small lump of cartilage. This is a remnant of what was originally the tip of the ear, when, ever so long ago, that organ, in our remote ancestors, had a point on it. Most of the apes today have pointed ears, but in human beings the upper edge of the organ has, in the course of ages, been folded over so as to cover the real tip.

Canadian Tribute to Lord Salisbury.

We have few men in this country who have managed to attain the position of a man like Lord Salisbury, who, in spite of his close connection with active politics, has in a measure found time to occupy himself with certain philosophical and scientific studies, which have given his mind a different poise to that of the younger race of English statesmen. While the younger men represent the energy and force of the present age, the British Empire has thanks to Providence for sparing such a man as the Premier of Great Britain who looks at questions affecting the welfare of the Anglo-Saxon people from a certain lofty aspect which cannot be attained by the man in the very stress of conflict, with fire and vehemence of early manhood in his veins. There comes a period of detachment, a wider, calmer vision, to the older man, and this has not the value in the eyes of our Canadian people that it should have; the attitude of the average youth of the present day is to set aside the counsels of the older men as "fossilized and obsolete." White hair is a signal for superannuation, and there are times when the virtue of the modern god, "energy," were so much more potent, could it only be tempered with the gentle wisdom and patience of old age.—Lally Bernard, in *The Toronto Globe*.
